COUNCILMAN DE ANGELO REPORT

1. We have a Detective Division report for the 2009 year: we had criminal cases initiated 230, criminal cases closed by exception 165, closed by arrest 68, criminal cases deemed pending 19, 3 deemed unfounded, 73 closed by investigation, 7 closed by property recovered and 7 prosecutions denied. Chief please offer my congratulations to Detective Sisco and his men for a job well done.

2. I have a letter here from the Orange County Department of Emergency Services, Walter Koury, "Under the United States of America Homeland Security

Presidential Directive 5 (HSPD-5) entitled, “Management of Domestic Incidents”, the Federal government created the National Incident Management Systems, or NIMS. This system directs the creation of a comprehensive, national approach to incident management by federal, state, territorial, tribal and local responders involved in disaster preparedness, prevention, response, and recovery activities. COUNCILMAN DE BUCK REPORT

- 1. The DPW staff did remove and take down the ice skating rink at the Pine Island Park.**
- 2. I know the Girl Scouts in Florida are working on putting together all of the details for Saturday, May 8th dog walk fundraiser, so the Town can proceed with enough funds to carry out building the dog park this summer at Union Corners Park. We would like to tell people who are dog lovers or want to help support the Girl Scouts to come to that event on May 8th.**
- 3. I know under new business we’re going to hopefully pass a resolution in regards to allowing people again to utilize Wickham Lake. The lake is owned by the Town for fishing and boating.**
- 4. I’d like to say Happy Easter and a blessed Passover for next week.**

COUNCILMAN GERSTNER REPORT

- 1. Hometown Online WVT is removing channels from their lineup which are Showtime channels, the Movie Channel, FLIX and Showcase. From Cablevision the Supervisor wrote a letter on behalf of our constituents and Cablevision appreciates the leadership position that Michael took with their negotiations with ABC Disney and he thanks them for that. They have a new three year contract with WABC. From Cablevision also effective April 15th they will relocate three high definition channels as follows: Universal HD from 744 to 745, Bravo HD from 745 to 744 and CNBC HD from 771 to 724 and that can be found on their website at www.cablevision.com.**
- 2. I would also like to wish everyone a Happy Holiday.**
- 3. The Recreation Commission is having a meeting tonight after our meeting.**

COUNCILMAN SHUBACK REPORT

- 1. We had a very busy and expensive winter with snow. January and February totals were \$276,897.00 and from that \$132,000 was spent on overtime, \$92,000 for salt and \$51,850.00 for sand. On top of that we had a lot of rain and a lot of emergency repairs on Old Mt. Peter Road, Tuxedo Road, Old Dutch Hollow Road, Oil City Road, Bellvale Lakes Road, Kay Road, Brady Road and Old Ridge Road.**

The Town spent a total of \$627,275.88 with the overtime, straight time, machine hours and materials. Drainage repairs alone were over \$600,000.

Supervisor Sweeton – Just to clarify the \$600,000 has not been finished yet. That is part of our submission request being the disaster declaration and we did understand that the State has certified Orange County and now we are waiting for the Federal Government, but that is the cost of that flooding event for the Town.

2. The Town of Warwick will be re-opening the gate at Wickham Lake on April 15, 2010. To access the lake, permit holders will need to purchase new tags for 2010 which will be available beginning April 5, 2010. A tag is required for each vehicle and boat. Under New Business we will have a resolution setting the fees for this season.

Supervisor Sweeton introduced Hon. Orange County Legislator Al Buckbee from District 10.

Hon. Al Buckbee – Orange County Legislator, District 10 – We have not met since our previous meeting here, so there is no new report. We will be having our meeting early at 10:30 a.m. for Youth and Government for all of the children in schools around the County joining us in government for that day.

SUPERVISOR'S REPORT

1. Community Preservation Fund Update – The month of February is one of our lowest receipts of \$19,136.96. It certainly reflects the doldrums of the housing market, so we hope that it will recover going forward. The total in the fund to date is \$2,140,642.31.

2. **ARRA East Shore Road drainage project - We had our pre-construction meeting today with the New York State DOT, the contractor awarded the bid and with our engineer in charge for the project, which is from McFarland Johnson who is the engineer that helped put the bid pack and design together and are also providing the engineer in charge of the project, so they'll be overseeing for the Town. The work will begin tentatively.... we will have a date a little more definitive at our next meeting, but its tentatively going to start the third week in April. Depending on how we scope this out it will be a two to three month project for the drainage improvements along the stretch of East Shore Road that is problematic to us and this is the stimulus funding of that project. Work there has been needed since I was going through minutes looking for something else at one point and there were complaints before the Town Board in the mid 1980's about the drainage issues on East Shore Road. I guess the wheels turn slowly, but we will be making some significant improvements along there and I look forward to it.**

3. **The Army Corp of Engineers visited the Wallkill River and Councilman DeBuck and I met and toured the Wallkill River and I don't know how many times we've done this Leonard, but today we had the courtesy of Congressman John Hall's office the Col. Boule' who is the Colonel in charge of Army Corp. from New York City up the Hudson Valley. We went over with him the issues that we need addressed for our farmers in the region. They have done a feasibility study for a project management plan, which is a precursor to ever getting any money from them to do physical work. In New York State however they need the New York State DEC to be the lead agency and a sponsor and we have had difficulty getting the DEC and Army Corp together to launch the project. Funding being an issue, the County has stepped up with some funding and the Colonel assured us within 30 days we will have a meeting with all of the relevant people and decision makers to hopefully get this project management plan launched. I thank Leonard for joining us and Paul Ruskiewicz from the Wallkill River Drainage District and County Legislator Tom Pahucki.**

4. **We are launching an upgrade for our website, which is long overdue to make it a little bit more user friendly and get some more information on it. Each department of the Town will have a section and there will be whatever relevant forms and information that we can put on there. A tentative launch date for the revised site is in May, so in April we will be testing it.**

5. **Supervisors Corner is in the Warwick Dispatch.**

6. **I had a piece of correspondence that came to us at the last meeting from the Florida Historical Society and I wanted to read it. "The birthplace of William Henry Seward, a visionary Secretary of State under Presidents Abraham Lincoln and Johnson has significant importance to not only the Village of Florida and the Town of Warwick, but also to the State and National Heritage. Within the Historical Society and networking beyond, we feel we have the skills, knowledge and as a not-for-profit organization, the ability to bring this site to a National noteworthy, historic site. We have the ability to apply for grants, a resource of volunteer and professional people to contribute time and skills to restore the Birthplace and the Mapes house on North Street and their environs. It includes the historically accurate restoration of the 18th century Birthplace and the 19th century**

Mapes house in a garden surround, appropriate for the name of the Village of Florida (floridius aetas, meaning covered with flowers). The iron fencing, carriage path and trees would be preserved as well to give the appearance of antiquity. This would become both a historic site and an educational center.” This was submitted by their president Gary Randall. I will open it up for privilege of the floor for anything on our agenda and obviously there is a motion on the agenda for the Town to consider the purchase of the Seward Homestead.

PRIVILEGE OF THE FLOOR (AGENDA ITEMS)

Linda Dubin – Resident, Village of Florida, NY 10921 – I wanted to bring something else to your attention about William Henry Seward. You should be very proud of William Henry Seward who was born in our Village of Florida from the time that he was a child through out his whole life he was a very strong advocate of abolition of slavery. When Seward was born in 1801 slavery existed in the Village of Florida in fact the Seward’s owned slaves and lived in part of the Seward house. Slavery was not abolished in New York State until 1827. As a child Seward lived with and became friendly with the slaves and saw them as humane beings. That was very important to him in how he felt about slavery. Throughout his life as a Governor, Senator, candidate for the Republican nomination for the Presidency in 1860, Secretary of State, he advocated the abolition of slavery by speaking and writing about it. In fact it probably caused him the nomination of 1860 because he realized that Lincoln was not as strongly advocating abolition of slavery as he was in keeping the union together. That came along later. As Secretary of State he was also Seward’s very good friend and right hand man. He encouraged Lincoln and I’m sure a good part of the input in writing of the Emancipation Proclamation was due to William Henry Seward’s encouragement. That is another reason why the Seward house should be preserved.

Gary Randall – President, Florida Historical Society, Florida, NY 10921 – I am here to add support as the Village is here as well with the Mayor. We are very anxious and excited about the fact that we could possibly restore the Seward Birthplace and the site around there. I just wanted to know if there were any questions you might have had over the last two weeks since we have talked. Actually the gentleman who did this, the architect, we talk about the excitement around the village and the Town of Warwick and beyond; this gentleman is from Montgomery. He is an architect who came over and did this. He took dimensions and pictures that we had and did this without any charge to the historical society or the Village of Florida. Just to give you a rendition of what it would look like, of course this is a 1797 house it’s a Georgian style or basically a pioneer style house, colonial style house. You probably saw the article in the Dispatch with pictures of what the house looks like now with a peek on it. That was put on in the early 1900’s for a cistern for water to be under pressure for the toilets and sinks. I guess Mr. Mapes was a man before his time, but he used water pressure from that cistern as you mentioned earlier. That would be included in this particular rendering as you see here because that was original to the house. This is what it would look like and again we’re excited about the fact that this could be a possibility for the Historical Society to be a part of the restoration

project. Thank you Michael for reading that letter and I think we have the potential of doing well here.

Councilman DeBuck – In all likelihood once it's closed upon and owned by a public entity your chance for receiving grant funds or endowments for its upkeep will be enhanced. Do you have any best guest likelihood on the time period for restoration?

Gary Randall – I guess what would happen, this architect would help us along to get started and I do have people in the society that have a background in restoration of buildings and stuff. I guess for the village to get contractors in here you have to have biddings, is that the way it usually works?

Supervisor Sweeton – For municipal work you would do bids.

Gary Randall – I have contact with people who know how to restore old houses, but I guess for legal setting you would have to have bidding. We would have to have people come in to get an idea of where to start and how much it would cost. The Historical Society is here to protect, preserve and restore. We don't destroy historic buildings, but there is one coming down in Florida for example in a few days or weeks, but we are saving parts to maybe use in the Mapes house or this one here or sell it on Craigslist or eBay to make money for which we can use to restore. I mentioned a gentleman by the name of Bob Marr who is very in touch with the universities that are interested in getting involved and he is in Monroe. He has contacts big contacts, so we may have choices from the universities. Yes we have an opportunity with a not-for-profit organization to get those grants in.

Hon. James Pawliczek – Mayor, Village of Florida, NY 10921 – If it comes to pass that the Village of Florida has title to the Seward property we will do whatever we can to see that it's restored properly. The Village of Florida will be the party in charge. We will engage the proper consultants and we will get the best people possible to apply for the state and federal funding and we will see it through until it is complete. It may only take a couple of years, but it may take longer and we're going to proceed based on the commitments we get for funding. When we get funding we will use village funds in a process until the funding actually arrives. We will not be starting projects or signing contracts or engaging people until we know where the money is coming from. Once we know where it's coming from then we'll be able to proceed with village funds and we'll make sure that we have the capable, qualified professionals that are capable of restoring it.

Motion Supervisor Sweeton, seconded Councilman Gerstner to adopt a resolution to authorize the expenditure of Community Preservation Funds not to exceed \$455,000.00 for the acquisition of the Seward Homestead, 35 N. Main St., Florida, NY (SBL# 105-2-24) pending satisfactory title insurance, acceptable appraisal verification and an agreement with the Village of Florida for the future ownership/maintenance and preservation of the property.

Motion Carried (5 ayes, 0 nays) Supervisor declared this resolution duly adopted.

Discussion: Supervisor Sweeton stated I think there are moments when you have opportunities that have lasting affect and Warwick has had many of those over the years with PDR, CPF and all of these things, but this in my mind certainly is one of those moments when we've got a real opportunity to preserve a very historic site that will have tremendous possibilities not only for the Village of Florida, but the Town of Warwick for years to come. I absolutely support it.

Councilman DeBuck – I would say it's not going to be a folly.

Supervisor Sweeton – Correct.

#R2010-102 AUTHORIZATION TO SIGN COMMITMENT FOR SALT FOR 2010-2011 SEASON

Motion Councilman Shuback, seconded Councilman DeAngelo to adopt a resolution to authorize the Commissioner of Public Works to sign a commitment for fifty-five hundred (5500) tons of salt for the 2010-2011 season.

Motion Carried (5 ayes, 0 nays) Supervisor declared this resolution duly adopted.

Discussion: Supervisor Sweeton stated because we need to commit to the contract price for the upcoming year.

#R2010-103 AUTHORIZATION TO SIGN AMENDED AGREEMENT FOR THE EXTENTION OF BELLVALE WATER DISTRICT

Motion Councilman Gerstner, seconded Councilman DeAngelo to adopt a resolution to authorize the Supervisor to sign an amended agreement for the extension of the Bellvale Water District, agreement dated December 20, 2007. Motion Carried (5 ayes, 0 nays) Supervisor declared this resolution duly adopted.

Discussion: Supervisor Sweeton stated this was a subdivision that's been approved and has not been finalized because most subdivisions have not due to the market. This applicant has gone back to the Planning Department to... under our code you're allowed to seek an approval in sections of a approved subdivision, so he's asking to do that. This subdivision entailed the applicant building the water system which will then relieve the issue of the uranium in the water for the small Bellvale Water District connecting the two. In an effort to move that forward he is applying for approval in sections, so if he gets that approval from the Planning Board he needed a modification of a water agreement with the Town to do so.

#R2010-104 ACCEPT BID – ZERO TURN LAWN MOWER

Motion Councilman Gerstner, seconded Councilman DeBuck to adopt a resolution to accept the bid for an eXmark LazerZ zero turn lawn mower with 72 inch mowing deck from Dombrowski's Lawn and Garden Center, 18 Meadow Rd., Florida, NY 10921 at a cost not to exceed \$ 8,555.00. Motion Carried (5 ayes, 0 nays) Supervisor declared this resolution duly adopted.

Discussion: Councilman DeBuck questioned Commissioner Feagles regarding the comparability of horsepower between the units and Commissioner Feagles agreed yes.

Supervisor Sweeton – Due to budget constraints we had a vendor mowing a bunch of our parks and Town Hall. To save money we are using our own personnel, but we needed this extra piece of equipment to do this, so it's a net savings to us overall this year and future years.
