**VISITING ELECTED OFFICIALS**

**Supervisor Sweeton introduced Hon. Orange County Legislator Al Buckbee from District 10.**

**Hon. Al Buckbee – Orange County Legislator, District 10 – On a County level in the paper you may have realized we are looking at Valley View. That is our biggest issue at the moment. We had a vote last week 14 to 7 to approve a study of all aspects of Valley View Nursing Home as it goes forward. Most importantly it is losing approximately about 18 million dollars a year right now and that’s a decent chunk of change. We would like to understand why that’s occurring and more importantly what that number is going to be in 5, 10 or 15 years down the road. Whether it’s going to decrease, increase or stay the same, so the necessary plans are going to meet the needs of our aging population here in Orange County. It is just a study we are not trying to disband the union or the members of that organization nor are we trying to decrease the service to our elderly population. That will be going forward and I can not imagine that study being completed by the end of this**

**year, but in that timeframe, within a year we should have some idea. I received some correspondence yesterday from the Town of Huntington, Long Island requesting a certificate of “Citizen of the Year” for Brigadier General Robert Dennis Kerr who is a resident of Warwick. I have not had the pleasure of meeting him yet, but we will be presenting him with an award on behalf of Orange County and the ceremony will be in Long Island.**

**COUNCILMAN DE ANGELO REPORT**

**1. For the month of May the Post Report is as follows: Greenwood Lake had 238 calls, the Town outside the Village had 1034 calls, Pine Island 348 calls and the Village of Warwick had 861 calls for a total of 2,481 calls for the month of May.**

**2. I would like to read an e-mail received from Ken Conroy to the Supervisor.**

**“This morning around 3:00 a.m. Warwick Police and EMS responded to a call on Distillery Glen Road for a reported unresponsive 40 year old male. Police Officers**

**Brett Lukach and Jason Braiser arrived on the scene first and found the patient unresponsive and pulse less. The officers immediately took appropriate actions and started CPR and deployed their defibrillators delivering a shock prior to EMS arrival. Once Warwick Ambulance first responders Frank Cassanite and Joann Cheney arrived they were presented with a viable patient although still in respiratory arrest, but had good vital signs due to actions of these two Police Officers. As the scene evolved Warwick PD stayed and engaged in the efforts to resuscitate and move this patient. Other Police Officers also arrived to help in the effort. Although I do not know what the ultimate outcome for our patient was, but it was certain that the actions from Police Officers Lukach and Braiser ensured that this patient had the best chance of survival given the dire condition in which he was found. All Warwick Emergency Services enjoy a good working relationship and in this case resulted in hope for a family which experienced I'm sure one of the most traumatic events a family can face."**

**3. The Greenwood Lake Elks will host their Flag Day Program at 1:30 p.m. at the Elks Lodge on Sunday, June 13<sup>th</sup>. On Saturday, June 19<sup>th</sup> there will be a model airplane meet at the Warwick Pilots Association. Unfortunately this is not open to the public, but there will be a lot of traffic and people expected there. We are letting people know it's not a public event, but there will be a lot of people there. On Saturday, June 12<sup>th</sup> the Warwick Valley Humane Society is having their annual fundraiser at the beautiful Applewood Winery. It is \$10 per person and children under 14 it's a \$1.**

#### **COUNCILMAN DE BUCK REPORT**

- 1. Thank you for allowing me to present the certificates to our dairy producers.**
- 2. In the effort to have people consume more milk the advertisement is for stronger bones and you should strive for three a day. What they ask people to do is to consume milk, cheese or yogurt. If you order a pizza pie, cheesecake or if you like yogurt for stronger bones we ask people to go ahead and consume those it helps our dairy farmers.**
- 3. Our parks are in good order. The Town of Warwick Department of Public Works has been assisting in Pine Island with three more landscape trees. There will be a curbing contractor that this Board okayed to do some work there and he plans on doing that tomorrow. Pine Island is getting spruced up a little bit and we appreciate this Board's support.**

- 1. The Youth Recreation Organized Sports season is in full swing. I'd like to thank all their officers and our Chairman of the Recreation Commission, Mike Cipolla, they are working well together and everything is running smooth. Commissioner if you could pass onto Deputy Commissioner Roe they appreciate all the efforts from the park personnel because the fields are in great shape.**
- 2. On June 19<sup>th</sup> will be the Warwick Fire Department Parade in the Village of Warwick starting at 6:00 p.m. From June 23<sup>rd</sup> until June 26<sup>th</sup> will be the Warwick Fire Department Carnival at Memorial Park with fireworks at 10:00 p.m. on the 26<sup>th</sup>.**

### SUPERVISOR'S REPORT

1. Community Preservation Fund - Receipts for the month of May were \$36,374.22 which brings the total receipt for the fund to date to \$2,267,692.05 and that has been reduced by the \$450,000 purchase price of the Seward Homestead. It rebounded somewhat from its April lull, so that was pretty good.

2. Crime Reporting - This is something that the Chief had brought to my

attention and it's been something we both had inquiries from residents over the course of the years. That people want to have sort of a sense if there a crime happening, where it might be happening, if there is a series of things in a neighborhood and how do we get that information out to them? The Chief has made contact with a company called Crime Reporting and what they do is coordinate with our police department to get an upload of crimes that we have responded to either closed or investing. It will populate that data, not on a real time basis, but in a fairly short time span to a map which will be accessible starting next week on the Towns website. It won't give details to exact locations, but it will give vicinities of where things might have happened and it will give the public a little sense of what maybe happening and what levels of things are happening. It will also populate from New York State data base any registered sex offenders that move into the area. That is not data that we're producing, but it is from the State registries. People can access that information which is available to the public and try to make it easily assessable via the Town's website. Look for that starting next week and we'll also have a release for the press at some point in the next day or so. We're going to trial it and see how it works and see what kind of public response we get if they find it helpful or not. I thank the Chief for coordinating that effort on our behalf.

3. I wanted to give the public an update on the RT. 94 rezoning - As you may remember or not remember we had our public hearing on the draft environmental impact statement and part of the process is we now take all those comments and produce a final document that will have, by law, answered concerns and issues raised by the public in the public hearing. That's winding its way to being completed and we hope to introduce that to the Board and the public in a final draft form in early July.

4. Hometown Alert Sign Up - I just want to remind people again that we do have an alert system where we can get a hold of people in emergencies. It's very easy to sign up even if you think you're in it if you go to the Town website, townofwarwick.org you can go to a box and plug your information in. Its not sold or used for anything else; it goes into the database and that way you'll be assured to get alerts in an event of an emergency in the Town. We have used it several times.

5. Monday, June 14<sup>th</sup> is Flag Day and hopefully people can display the American Flag proudly outside their homes or businesses.

6. On June 12<sup>th</sup>, Saturday at 1:00 p.m. is the Gaelic Society picnic at the American Legion in Greenwood Lake. The Gaelic Society is a great organization that supports the community and it sounds like it might be a good time.

It costs the Town somewhere in the neighborhood of a half of a million dollars to do one. There has been some movement in doing reassessments on a yearly basis through computer modeling, so that is very relevant and the topic of this particular conference.

**#R2010-151 SUSTAINABLE ENERGY FINANCING PROGRAM**

**Motion Supervisor Sweeton, seconded Councilman Gerstner to adopt the following resolution:**

**WHEREAS the Town of Warwick, County of Orange County shares the goal of increasing energy efficiency throughout its community, reducing energy costs for residents, reducing carbon emissions to help mitigate climate disruption, and reducing the negative health effects of fossil fuel emissions, while increasing availability of jobs in our area;**

**WHEREAS Governor Paterson has called for New Yorkers to meet 45% of New York State's electricity needs through improved energy efficiency and clean renewable energy by 2015;**

**WHEREAS the Town of Warwick, County of Orange is uniquely positioned because of its clear mandate to protect and enhance the local community while sharing an interest in:**

- a. Informing and inspiring the public of energy saving opportunities;**
- b. Making energy efficiency and renewable energy the options of first choice;**
- c. Creating and retaining local jobs;**
- d. Reducing fossil fuel emissions and total energy use in a manner that is environmentally sustainable and, to the maximum extent practicable, maximizes additional benefits for local and regional communities;**

**WHEREAS the Town of Warwick, County of Orange is uniquely positioned to run good programs because of its clear mandate to protect and enhance the local community while sharing the objectives of establishing mechanisms and strategies for:**

- a. Achieving broader community participation and greater energy efficiency savings from building retrofits;**
- b. Achieving broad community acceptance of renewable energy sources;**
- c. Creating programs that demonstrate the benefits of gaining economies of scale and designing a viable strategy for program sustainability;**
- d. Delivering verified energy savings from a variety of projects locally, with a particular emphasis on efficiency improvements in buildings; and**
- e. Achieving inter-municipal cooperation in other efficient ways.**

**WHEREAS the Town of Warwick, County of Orange wishes to explore mutually beneficial ways of:**

- a. Leveraging private sources of capital with other public and private resources to accomplish these objectives; and**
- b. Coordinating efforts with Federal, State, and other agencies and authorities to assure that activities are compatible with the plans and programs of the cooperating municipalities;**

**WHEREAS, by Chapter 497 of the Laws of 2009, the State of New York authorized an amendment of the General Municipal Law by creating Article 5-L to allow municipalities to create Sustainable Energy Financing Programs to promote the deployment of renewable energy systems and energy efficiency improvement measures at residential and commercial properties and,**

**WHEREAS, the establishment of a Sustainable Energy Financing Program in the**

**Town of Warwick, County of Orange would serve to assist in achieving statewide energy efficiency and renewable energy goals, reducing greenhouse emissions to mitigate the effect of global climate disruption, and creating a clean energy economy and,**

**WHEREAS, a Sustainable Energy Financing Program would also bolster the economy of the Town of Warwick, County of Orange by saving residents monies which they would otherwise spend on energy costs and by creating jobs for residents, and reduce the negative health effects of burning fossil fuels;**

**WHEREAS, Sustainable Energy Financing Programs are designed to be self supporting and are designed to have no adverse budgetary impact to the Town of Warwick, County of Orange and will be an "opt-in" benefit affecting only those residents who choose to participate by undertaking renewable energy or energy efficiency projects on properties they own;**

**WHEREAS, a Sustainable Energy Financing Program may create an opportunity for the Town of Warwick, County of Orange to obtain American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009 ("ARRA") funding to support the program,**

**WHEREAS, the Sustainable Energy Financing Program enabled by Article 5-L should be amended to allow broader sources of funding while securing and facilitating such programs. Such legislation is now pending in the New York State Senate and Assembly,**

**NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the Town Board of the Town of Warwick, County of Orange supports pending legislation in the NYS Senate (#S7683) and companion legislation in the NYS Assembly (#TBA) \_\_\_\_\_ to amend, strengthen and correct technical deficiencies within the current enabling laws authorizing Sustainable Energy Financing Programs.**

**Motion Carried (5 ayes, 0 nays) Supervisor declared this resolution duly adopted.**

**Discussion: Supervisor Sweeton stated that's it's a long winded way of saying that New York State passed a law that prescribed funding to come from only one source and we are asking the State to amend their legislation to broaden the source of funding. This program is a workable program at the local level.**
