REPORTS OF BOARDS AND DEPARTMENT HEADS:

POLICE CHIEF JOHN RADER – Thank you, Mr. Supervisor. Some of the items in here are kind of redundant. I've talked about them at other meetings, but I feel it's important, and I'm going to highlight some of these at my meeting going forward while this goes on. So, the first thing is going to be the board's own reminder. Last month, last week, or last meeting, rather, you highlighted many of the areas that are going to be affected by construction over the next couple of years. We do plan to closely monitor these work zones for compliance, and it's out of abundance of precaution for the workers. So, whether it's our DPW, state, private contractors, there's work going on everywhere, and we're just asking people to be patient and obey all the laws.

The Warwick Fire Department is currently holding their annual Carnival at Veterans Memorial Park. This also concludes on Saturday with the fireworks at the dark, so we do expect increased pedestrian and vehicle traffic congestion in those areas.

Our Junior Police Academy is quickly filling up both sessions, so if anyone is still interested, I would get the applications in soon. Session one is from 7-14 to 7-25, and session two from 8-4 to 8-15.

We're currently receiving a lot of registrations for National Night Out on August 5th at Veterans Memorial Park from 5 p.m. to 8 p.m., and we're hoping to see a large turnout from the community.

Again, another reminder that I do every meeting is the prescription drug medication collection bin that we have in our lobby. We're emptying that pretty much every other week of prescription medications, so we'd rather keep shipping these out for destruction than have them be available in people's houses if they're no longer being used.

School is out. Will be out as of tomorrow for summer recess. Please be mindful of the children that will be present in the neighborhoods.

Officer Kevin Halsey will be retiring tomorrow after over 20 years of dedicated service to the Town of Warwick. He's retiring along with his K-9 partner, Rocky. So, at 3 p.m., we will have a walkout in the parking lot. Our walkouts have become a tradition for our retirees. They come out of the station for the last time as a police officer. We escort them down and turn them back over to their families and thank them for everything that they gave to the town and to the residents. During Officer Halsey's career, he had three different K-9s, which is unheard of in the K-9 officer world that somebody did it three different times. Supervisor, you highlighted what that involves, that extra dedication they're with that dog pretty much 24-7. They're off time. They have to keep exercising the dog. There's a lot of training. Kevin is known around the state for how he trains, and he's been highly decorated and awarded for the training.

The last thing I wanted to do was highlight the first responders in the town. Last board meeting, I think we heard a lot of sirens during it. So just to give everyone an idea of what went on during a one-hour period, both Warwick and Greenwood Lake Fire Departments and EMS were performing a rescue of an injured hiker on the Appalachian Trail. During that time, we received a report of a drowning in a pool where lifesaving measures were performed, and successfully performed, they were able to revive the victim. We also at the same time received a report of a bicyclist down. Again, lifesaving measures needed to be taken and then during all of that, we also had a bicyclist and a car accident. Each was in a different section of the town or the village, and each was handled efficiently, and it was by the three agencies that volunteered in the town. So, I just want to give a good shout-out to all the first responders for the type of work they do. That's a lot of work because of the one-hour period. That's all I have.

SUPERVISOR DWYER - I would just say the one thing, certainly very important to make sure that we are enforcing the work zone speeds, but also looking at the pass-throughs and the detour locations like Sanfordville Road is going to be heavily trafficked when they're doing the roundabout. When they're doing the paving, people are going to be using that as a cut-through. Unfortunately, we just have to double the size of your police department so we can staff enough people on the roads, right?

POLICE CHIEF JOHN RADER – I was waiting for you to say that.

SUPERVISOR DWYER - But, yeah, just as important as that is these side roads are going to be inundated with people flying down the road. So, it's going to be tough. It's going to be a tough time.

POLICE CHIEF JOHN RADER – We are monitoring. I mean, unfortunately, just tonight, we were talking about before the meeting, near the work zone where Brady and Ball Road are closed right now, we had a car rollover there. So, obviously, speed was a factor in that as well. Yes, we are monitoring the actual work zones where workers are performing the job. We want them to get it done safely and go home to their families. Obviously, when we get done quickly, it should be well. But we'll be monitoring the areas around it just directly because it does create speed issues, aggressive driving issues, and it's just not acceptable.

DPW COMMISSIONER, BENJAMIN ASTORINO – Good evening. We've been dealing with some rain events that come in, rainstorms that are rain events that seem to slow us down tremendously. We are still paving. We're working on getting ready to pave it. We are 99 percent done with all the roads. We replaced the culvert pipes on Royal Court with a 15-inch by 60-foot culvert pipe. Also, we did an 18-inch by 18-inch catch basin with a 4-inch perf pipe, 50 feet long, on Royal Court. On Almond Tree Lane, we replaced an 18-inch pipe by a 48-foot culvert pipe. Hunt Drive, we repaired basins and Kosuga Lane, we repaired basins. Four Corners Road, as I mentioned, the rain events. We had a washout, a significant washout at Four Corners Road that was repaired on Thursday morning.

Kain Road, we are clearing ditches. Sunrise Ridge, we're clearing ditches. Mowing, town-wide, we're out with 2 road mowers daily. We finished the cul-de-sacs. Potholes were out. We're filling the hot mix, as always. We did also material. We finished hauling our material for the cold mix paving for the roads. That is completely done. As I pointed out, our paver is considerably behind because of all the rain. I've been in contact with him. Hopefully, we'll get back on schedule shortly. Our roads are ready to go and be paved, so we will be ready for that.

Our FEMA projects, as I said last meeting, Old Ridge Road is complete. Ball Road is nearing completion. Possibly another 10 days or 2 weeks, that will be done. Monday, the 30th, Hoyt Road will be closed for approximately 5 weeks. We got word of that today. That will start with our other culvert projects.

Our parks department, our parks personnel are trying diligently to keep up. With all this weather, the grass is growing. They are doing a tremendous job. They are catching up as we

speaking. Also, we finished the top soil at Airport Park today and that is complete. We'll get the railing up next week, the last of the railing up next week. Any questions?

SUPERVISOR DWYER - We do have a resolution tonight to add one more person to the park, so hopefully that helps a little bit.

DPW COMMISSIONER, BENJAMIN ASTORINO – Absolutely. It's just a part-timer the poor guy got smacked in the face with a softball. He was out a week. So, it happens.

SUPERVISOR DWYER - Yeah, it's tough. Too many parks to do for three guys.

DPW COMMISSIONER, BENJAMIN ASTORINO - Absolutely.

SUPERVISOR DWYER - And one of them is out.

DPW COMMISSIONER, BENJAMIN ASTORINO - Yeah, it's a lot. With the weather, you can't mow in the pouring rain.

SUPERVISOR DWYER - You kind of didn't really answer about when the paver might come. Do you have an idea?

DPW COMMISSIONER, BENJAMIN ASTORINO - Because I do not know. The last I talked to him was two days ago. He was going to get back to me. I'm hoping second week of July.

SUPERVISOR DWYER - Okay.

DPW COMMISSIONER, BENJAMIN ASTORINO - I don't want to say a date because it's really...

SUPERVISOR DWYER - It's better than August. That's usually when it comes.

DPW COMMISSIONER, BENJAMIN ASTORINO - It really is. We thought we'd have Hunt Drive paved. That was supposed to be paved, the weather just killed his schedule. Like I said, all our roads are ready, we have one more pipe to put in, and then all our roads are ready to be paved. We're ready when he is.

WATER & SEWER, DEPUTY COMMISSIONER MATTHEW MCPHERSON – Good evening, everybody. I don't have much to report tonight, which is a good thing. The plants and pump stations and the wastewater planter, all being checked seven days a week. Preventative maintenance was completed for the month at the water and sewer plants. All the wastewater sampling for the month and quarter has been collected and submitted. The regulatory reporting for the month has also been submitted as well. We continue to make repairs in the Greenwood Lake Summer System. It's always just an ongoing repair being made up there. We repaired leaks on Brook Trail, Deer Trail north and south, and a leak yesterday on Indian Trail north.

We removed a burnt motor from the pump house, and we sent that out for a repair and are pricing on a possible replacement if need be. I just wanted to mention again, we were out walking around in Wickham, Eurich Heights, and Bellvale Park areas collecting quarterly meter readings. That should be done by Tuesday of next week.

Again, on the Pine Island new well, all the equipment is installed and in place. Everything is ready to be turned on and run. We're just waiting for it to be okay from the health department, which is taking a long time. Nothing really noteworthy at the wastewater treatment plants. They've been running okay. We continue making minor repairs, and it's down to maintenance. We're just trying to get to the upgrade.

SUPERVISOR DWYER - Did you say that sample needs to be done by the 30th?

WATER & SEWER, DEPUTY COMMISSIONER MATTHEW MCPHERSON – What was that? The Pine Island water samples? Yes.

SUPERVISOR DWYER - Did you talk to them about that?

WATER & SEWER, DEPUTY COMMISSIONER MATTHEW MCPHERSON – Yes.

SUPERVISOR DWYER - What did they say?

WATER & SEWER, DEPUTY COMMISSIONER MATTHEW MCPHERSON – It's not approved yet. They're waiting for the state to approve it. They said just take it with what you've got.

SUPERVISOR DWYER - This is unbelievable. We were hoping that we could have the well turned on before we had to take our next samples because the samples fail, and we know that the water quality from the new well will not fail, and they won't let us turn it on. We'll fail for one more quarter, and then hopefully that's our last, right?

WATER & SEWER, DEPUTY COMMISSIONER MATTHEW MCPHERSON – Yes.

SUPERVISOR DWYER - One more door-to-door session for the quarter.

RECREATION DIRECTOR, SAM WALTER – Thank you, Supervisor. The pools have been super busy because it was so hot. The lifeguards are doing a great job. I think on Saturday they had over 167 people sign in to use the pool. Not all the time, but it was a busy day for them. Today, not as busy. It was cooler.

Swim lessons start on July 7th. They're on Mondays and Wednesdays in the morning and late afternoon. We're also starting a new program at the pools on Tuesday mornings in July. It's a swim safety program with alamo campers that are at the Pine Island School that's run by the Warwick Area Farm Workers Association. It's the first chance that these children will have to get in a pool and swim. We did have a great donation from the not-for-profit Small Things for life jackets for all of these campers. So, it's going to be a really fun program with the lifeguards in the water, lifeguards on deck, and campers in life jackets. So, it should be great. Dial-a-Bus is helping out with busing from the Pine Island School to get to the park for the pools and then back.

The park's really busy right now with the Tai Chi retreat. So, there's lots of cabins being used right now for that retreat. You may have gotten an invite to come out on Sunday. They're planning to put on a parade and some free demonstrations of Tai Chi from 1 to 4 this Sunday at the park.

The second food truck fest is coming up on July 3rd. So, if you missed the first one, I hope you come out for the second one. It's great food, lots of live music, good time. That's it.

SUPERVISOR DWYER - I'm going to be away for the Tai Chi thing, but Floyd said he's going to participate. He's leading the Tai Chi parade. Thank you so much. Appreciate it.

SUPERVISOR DWYER - Not on our list for reports, but I do want to welcome Donna Mars, our new coordinator for the Friendly Visitor Program. She attended our workshop before and introduced herself to the town board. Councilman DeAngelo usually presents the Friendly Visitor Program reports and statistics that will come from you, but I appreciate you coming tonight and welcome to the team.

TOWN BOARD REPORTS:

COUNCILMAN DEANGELO - Okay, good evening. Suzyn Barron, who is the President of the Warwick Valley Humane Society, was presented with the New York State Senate Recommendation Award by Senator Skoufis in recognition for her 35 years as Director with the Warwick Valley Humane Society, overseeing the care of our community's homeless pets and for the reconstruction of the Warwick Animal Shelter, which was praised as a premier shelter not only in Orange County but throughout the Hudson Valley. Suzyn does a fantastic job. The Humane Society is hosting a Shelter Volunteer Appreciation Day this Sunday in recognition of our valued volunteers who help them care for their shelter residents.

Leo Kaytes Ford is hosting the Leo Kaytes Senior Memorial Car Show with food vendors, raffles, and a challenge to fill the bed of the Ford F-150 truck with donations, all to benefit the Humane Society. This event is on Sunday, July 6th, at the dealership from 11:00 a.m. to 2:00 p.m., and it's open to all.

Jordan's Way is returning to Warwick on July 16th. This is a live online fundraiser incorporating staff, directors, and volunteers willing to make fools of themselves to raise money for the shelter. All are invited to attend and participate, if you dare to, or at the very least join on Facebook and participate with your credit card. This event also features the animals available for adoption.

The center is exploding with kittens and wonderful adult cats. Summer is a purr-fect, she said, time to bring home a feline family member. Applications are available at wvhumane.org or call for more information, 845-986-2473. Visits are by appointment only.

As a reminder, please be mindful of the heat and its effect on your pets. Be sure if outside they have adequate shade and cool, clean water. Leave them home and never unattended in your vehicle, which recently happened in the town, causing a dog to have a seizure in several days of hospitalization when the temperature was only in the 70s. It's not worth it.

The shelter is always in need of the following, paper towels, bleach, pate' canned cat food, pate' canned kitten food, and peanut butter, and check the ingredient for xylitol free only.

As far as the Friendly Visitor Program goes, they're having virtual training on July 17th or July 31st. You can contact them at 845-341-1173, extension 305. Now, this is helping seniors with transportation, grocery shopping, visits, and phone calls. So, if you think you have some time to devote to that program, please call. That's all I have.

COUNCILMAN KOWAL - Thank you. As I reported before, I'm working with John Ruszkiewicz and Mr. Youngman about installing two new historic markers. Yesterday, I went on the website for the Pomeroy Foundation. They're the ones who manage the historic markers for New York State since they stopped funding it. I got all the information in. We're all queued up. But when I went to the page to actually do the application, it was blank. So, I

called them up, and they said that this round, we just missed this round of grants. The next one is October 6th. I entered the information on behalf of the town, and we're all queued up. All I have to do is enter the information, what the wording is on the marker, its exact longitude and latitude, and we're going to be in the system. So, this should make it easier for future applications because we already have all the pertinent information entered into the computer already into their website. October 6th, I will be there first thing in the morning to make sure our markers are in line for consideration. If any future markers need to be done, I'd be glad to pass along the information on or I'll do it, pass along the information on how to apply and what the criteria is.

COUNCILMAN MATTINGLY - Thank you, Supervisor Dwyer. The Village of Warwick and the Warwick Valley Chamber of Commerce will hold its sidewalk sale on Saturday, July 12th, and Sunday, July 13th in the Village of Warwick. Join us for Warwick's beloved two-day shopping event. Stroll down Main Street to see your favorite stores and local vendors with unique wares in tow. Then bring the family over to Railroad Avenue where there will be various kid-friendly activities and merchants selling toys, crafts, games, and more.

COUNCILMAN SHUBACK – Thank you, Mr. Supervisor. I would just like to inform people that right now through Florida and Pine Island, there's a lot more sweetcorn being grown. So, the next couple weeks, you might hear propane cannons going off to scare the birds away. Or some of the farmers now use a green laser. So 5 o'clock in the morning, if you're driving by and you see this green light bouncing around out in the fields, that's what it's there for, to scare the birds away. No reason to call the police department if you hear the noise of the propane cannons or anything.

TOWN CLERK ASTORINO - I just want to remind everybody that the pool is open now seven days a week from 10:00 a.m. to 6:00 p.m. Come into my office at the Town Clerk's and get your pool passes.

SUPERVISOR DWYER - Just some DOT roadwork updates. This is the State of New York roadways, 17A, Route 94, roadwork is currently happening in the Village of Florida, Village of Warwick, Town of Warwick, and Town of Goshen. The Village of Florida on Willet Street, 17A and 94 Meadow Road, 17A and 94 on Washington Ave, and 17A and 94 between Bridge

Street. There is also construction in the area of Florida, Green Drive, daily closures for the next two to three weeks. The Village of Warwick at the intersection of 17A, 94, and West Street, daily lane closures, and that will be for at least another week. In the Town of Warwick, 17A near Homestead Village Drive, daily lane closures for at least a week. Route 94 between Warwick Turnpike and Sanfordville Road at Pennings Lane. They are working on a culvert replacement, one-way traffic utilizing a temporary signal, and that will be for the next two months. Route 94 between the New Jersey Line and Warwick Turnpike. That's where they're planning to pave, and there will be some pavement and shoulder repair, daily lane closures for the next two to three weeks. Route 94 between the New Jersey Line and the Warwick Turnpike roadside ditch cleaning, shaping, and daily lane closures for two to three weeks. Also, just to mention it, in the Town of Goshen, they are doing work 17A and 94 between Houston Road and Pulaski Highway, shoulder and embankment repair, one-way traffic utilizing a temporary signal for the next two months. Commissioner Astorino mentioned and gave us the update on the FEMA projects, the culvert repairs, and it seems like that's on schedule. Everything is on target. We're hoping to be done with that entire project by September 5th, making sure that we both comply with our FEMA reimbursement schedule, as well as get this out of the way before we get that heavy fall, apple-picking, leaf-peeper traffic. So that seems to be going well.

The bike hike project, which is we'll just call it the trail between Cascade Road and Hickory Hills, is moving along quite well. We did get the material in for the bridge, and that bridge is going to be put together in the next week or two, and they're going to work on the final items with that trail, and we look forward to that trail opening in the next two to three weeks. We took a hike on that trail two weeks ago, and it really came out great. It's one of the nicest hiking trails that I think I've ever walked on. It really is good. What did we measure it at? Two miles, Sam? Is that what it was, about two miles? It's a one-way trail. It's not a loop. We hope maybe at some point we'll make it a loop, but for now, it's a one-way trail. We parked the vehicle on one side and got dropped off on the other side, and, you know, you kind of figure it out that way. But it's short enough where you could do it both ways, and it's a good trail.

Wickham Sewer District, this is something you're going to hear pretty much every meeting for the next year, just as you've heard for the last two years, because the grant application season is really starting now. We've already submitted four applications, two to our federal senators, one to our U.S. congressmen. We've submitted an application to EFC to get listed on the IUP for the eligibility. We will soon submit for WQIP. It's all acronyms. I'm not going to even tell you what the actual words are. But we've got a grant coming up July 31st, which is the big one, very important, and then we've got another grant coming up September 1st. So, that will bring us to a total of six grant applications submitted this year alone, and each of them have the new information of a consent order as well as the income survey, which makes us eligible for grant funding. So, the grant writing firm has been instrumental in putting these grant applications together. If you don't have a grant writing firm, I don't have the technical savvy to do these, so we'd have to pay an engineering firm between \$100 and \$200 an hour to submit these grant applications. We're on a contract with our grant writing firm, and they can write these, and it doesn't cost us an extra dollar to write unlimited

applications. So, the timing for that grant writing firm just submitting these has paid for itself. Obviously, you need the engineers for the technical data and the technical review, so we're partnering together and merging everything together for this process, and it's working out extremely well.

The Jayne Street Bridge design is underway. There's no changes to that. I'm just going to mention it. If any changes happen, we'll update the board.

Another great thing that's coming out of the grant writer, the grant firm, is they're notifying me of grants every week. They're constantly letting me know. They've probably notified us of 40 different grants, and I think we've got about 10 to 15 apps in process right now. We're obviously not throwing everything out there, but we're trying to be very selective and really just apply for the grants that make sense for us to apply, things that we're going to qualify for, and grants that we're going to have a shot at winning. And one that's very interesting right now is a New York Bricks grant due August 15th, and Recreation Director Walter and I are working very hard on it. She's working harder than me, of course, but it's to put together an application for upgrading our hockey rink at Union Corners Park and converting that into a year-round facility that can serve both as a summertime skate as well as a winter ice skating rink. That will be completely closed, covered rather, and we're going to be applying for probably in excess of a million dollars for that project. But I think it's a great thing. It's something that I've always wanted to see from the time that I was mayor until now and never really found a good grant that would cover a project like this, but our grant writers found what they felt was a very good fit for this type of a project, so we're applying for that.

The multi-use trail project, which is a partnership between the Village of Warwick and the Town of Warwick, is progressing quite well. We will be applying for grant funding, the CFA round, which is due July 31st, so we're kind of entering a little bit early into the grants phase for this. We're still doing the feasibility study, but we're going to apply not with the expectation that we're going to win the grant, but what's good about CFA is even if you don't get the grant, you'll get feedback. On what they thought you could improve on, and that will give us time to perform and put together a better grant application for when we think we're fully ready to get funding for that. But the multi-use trail is a very exciting trail that will link the village, the downtown Village of Warwick, with the Price Chopper and ShopRite Corridor shopping district. And again, we're still in the feasibility study where we're drawing the route, the potential route. We're dealing with local stakeholders and property owners along the route to make sure that everybody's on board. Then once we get that, get a little bit further in the process, we'll really charge ahead full speed.

We'll be applying for an MS4 grant, and we're going to begin the work for the Centennial Park at Thomas Morahan Waterfront Park, which is the old Brown Property that the town acquired next to the Thomas Morahan Waterfront Park, so we'll hope to start breaking ground on that right after the summer season, the beach season, at Greenwood Lake. We will be accepting a bid on a redesign for our website. We are obligated, as per state law, to change over to a .gov. Right now, we are at townofwarwick.org, so we're townofwarwick.org, and the new website, not yet, is going to be townofwarwickny.gov. Unfortunately, if there's

more than one of the same municipal names, we have a Village of Warwick and a Town of Warwick, they're going to be villageofwarwickny.gov. There's also a Warwick, Rhode Island, which I get emails about, why is the ocean beach closed, you know, this week, or why is Beach Street not swept, and it's Warwick, Rhode Island, not Warwick, New York.

TOWN CLERK ASTORINO - And Massachusetts.

SUPERVISOR DWYER - I didn't know about that one. The .gov is a national thing, so it's not a statewide, so we've got to basically use a very unique name, and it's pretty annoying. I wanted warwick.gov, but that doesn't comply with the rules that they've set. We're also going to create an app. It's going to be a town mobile app, so that you can get push notifications about recycling, about special events, road closures, and various other things, and it will also create what will be known as a virtual clerk. The clerk's office, the building department, the supervisor's office constantly gets phone calls and questions that could be very easily answered by AI. Now, I know AI is a tricky thing these days, people don't really fully understand it. I don't particularly like it. I think it's going to, you know, we're going to see the Terminator come out of all of this, but that's okay. There's not much that I can do about it other than embrace it and try to use it in a way that will support the community, and hope that it doesn't destroy everything, you know, eventually. But we're going to use AI to basically answer a lot of questions that might come in, and that will save time for people to have it, to call the Town Clerk, call the building department, have greater access to permits, and paperwork, and documents on our website. So, we're going to start that process to rebuild and rebrand the entire town website, and make sure that it is meeting today's standards, and helping create a more efficient government.

One more thing I forgot to mention during the workshop, the Pine Island tennis courts were repaved, but unfortunately, like our paver, the paver got backed up, and then the striper, which is a very unique paint company, that you can't just paint tennis courts with any paint. It's a very specialized paint, and there aren't very many companies that do that service. So, they're backed up as well. So, the Pine Island tennis courts, which the timing kind of works out pretty well, because they're going to have the summer camp for the entire month of July. So, people won't really be using the tennis courts during July, but we won't, we will not have that court painted with the special paint for another three to four weeks. So, kind of frustrating to get so far, and have such a nice thing done, and you can't actually use it yet, but that's quite all right. All right, that concludes my report.


