This is an important reminder that mosquito-borne illnesses like West Nile Virus are present in our region. The Orange County Department of Health is here to keep you informed and safe. They provide the tools, resources, and guidance residents need to prevent mosquitoes from breeding and to reduce the risk of bites to themselves and their families. Residents should always try to protect themselves but especially now that West Nile Virus positive mosquitoes have been detected in the County. Residents should wear appropriate clothing, consider sprays when

outdoors, and check their property for any pooling or stagnant water. If found, it should be removed as soon as possible.

Other ways residents can reduce the risk of mosquito bites:

- Minimize outdoor activities between dusk and dawn
- Wear shoes and socks, long pants, and a long-sleeved shirt when you are outdoors for long periods of time, or when mosquitoes are most active
- Consider using mosquito repellent when it is necessary to be outdoors, particularly during evening activities, e.g., fishing. Be sure to follow the directions on the label.

Mosquitoes can breed in any stagnant water that lasts more than four days. To reduce the mosquito population around your home and property, take the following steps to reduce or eliminate standing water:

- Dispose of tin cans, plastic containers, ceramic pots, or similar water-holding containers.
- Drill drain holes in the bottoms of recycling containers that are kept outdoors.
- Make sure that your roof gutters drain properly, and clean clogged gutters in the spring and fall.
- Turn over wading pools and wheelbarrows when not in use.
- Change the water in birdbaths twice a week.
- Remove all discarded tires from your property.
- Clean vegetation and debris from the edges of ponds.
- Drain water from pool covers. Also, remove leaves and debris as they collect on covers to reduce breeding areas.
- Use landscaping to eliminate standing water that collects on your property.

REPORTS OF BOARDS AND DEPARTMENT HEADS:

POLICE CHIEF JOHN RADER: Thank you, Mr. Supervisor. I have a brief report tonight. Session two of the Junior Police Academy graduates tomorrow morning at Mountain Lake Park. The program was once again a success this summer, thanks to the hard work that our SROs put into the program and the support from the Warwick School District and of course the town board. I just want to note that in addition to the SROs, many of our department members also contribute to the JPA, whether it's our K9 program, our detectives, the drone instructors that we have at the Police Academy, they all contribute to the success of the program and give the drill crews the most that they can in those 10 days.

National Night Out was held on August 5th and was well attended by both the community and stakeholders from around the town that brought vehicles, set up information booths and activities for the kids. We appreciate all of the support that we received. It was a good crowd, good weather. So, another one in the books.

Detective Sean Tetzlaff will be retiring tomorrow. He has dedicated 20 years protecting the town with 17 of them as a detective. Sean showed up to work every day giving it his all,

guiding our new officers and contributing, or conducting rather, exceptional investigations. He is going to be sorely missed. At 3 p.m. he will walk out of the station for the last time. Following our tradition, our supervisors will be walking him to his family to give him back with our gratitude and appreciation for all the sacrifices that they made while he worked here. Just a reminder, schools return to session beginning in September. All rural residents are reminded to drive carefully and avoid school bus signals.

That is all I have unless there is any comments or questions from the board.

SUPERVISOR DWYER- Any questions for the chief? Thank you.

DPW COMMISSIONER BENJAMIN ASTORINO- Good evening. The last couple of weeks we were busy installing some culvert pipes. Benedict Drive, we installed 70 feet of 10-inch pipe and two 2-foot catch basins that we had issues with there. West Ridge Road, we installed 80 feet of five foot culvert pipe under an old cattle crossing that was giving way and that was an economical repair and it worked out really well. Four Corners Road, we had some erosion on the roadside ditches. It has been pretty bad with all the rain we've had. We put 240-ton blacktop, secured the ditches and installed 60 feet of two-foot culvert pipe. Ketchum Road and Cascade Lake Road are the last two roads we have to prepare for paving. They are being ditched as we speak. Ketchum was finished last week and Cascade Lake Road has a couple more days and then we'll be ready to go.

Tree work, we worked with O&R on 99 Sanfordville Road to take down two dead ash trees. We will take down the last one as a DPW. Pot Holes, we are out and about. Road signs, we are out and about.

FEMA projects are moving along very well. Hoyt Road was opened this afternoon. Ball Road will be opened tomorrow afternoon. The heavy work on Cascade Road, the crane is left, the culvert is in the ground. That will be completed within two weeks as will Pumpkin Hill, the closure force are being done and backfilling as we speak. So that should be done also in a couple weeks and that'll complete all the FEMA projects.

Paving, I talked to the contractor last week, end of August, they should be back to finish our three roads.

DPW COMMISSIONER, BENJAMIN ASTORINO- Thanks.

RECREATION DIRECTOR, SAM WALTER- Thank you, Supervisor. So, the park's been busy with a lot of events including a very large wedding that we had mid-July. It coincided with some work on the arts building and we had lost power but thanks to Steve Slattery, Skyward Electric and DPW working foreman Walter Schultz, they really helped get the park back up and running. Walt was great and dropped off some emergency lighting for us so it turned out well. Wedding guests said it was the best wedding they had ever attended so we were happy about that. Pools have been busy, we did finish the lessons and it was a great season for swim lessons.

We did some surveys with the parents and the parents really enjoyed that the kids learned a lot, they liked Duck Rescue again, it was their favorite game. They did have some good suggestions for us and that was about registration for next year, if we could do that online. They also requested swim lessons for adults which was pretty interesting as well.

The pools close September 2nd, right after Labor Day and we planned to start construction on the waiting pool and the repairs of the two existing pools right away.

We just completed another town survey for the future multipurpose or multi-use hockey rink or rink and it was a really great survey because people were very interested in the learn to skate program and public skate besides ice hockey and roller hockey and I just thought, well that's pretty neat that people want to actually learn to skate because we did as kids but there hasn't been enough ice around to really learn so it was great support, community support for the project, the Grant Funded Project.

Just want to tell people about an event at the park this Saturday, which is the Fuller Moon Arts Festival. It is a great event; it starts at 1 p.m. on Saturday and ends at 9 p.m. There is lots of great music, dance performances, food, and activities to be involved in. One of the

performance groups is a New York based dance company called Forces of Nature. They are actually staying at the park this whole week so they are using the housing and they are collaborating with the Work Dance Collective and then they will be performing at 6 p.m. on Saturday.

Lastly, I want to make sure that I thank an Eagle Scout, Eugene Cummings. He is from Scout Troop 45. He completed a kayak rack at the park, which has the park's canoe on it right now but some spaces for some more kayaks in the future. It was a great project and we will have to set up a ribbon cutting ceremony for him soon. That is it for my report.

She asked me to tell you that she has visited all groups this past month and dropped off flyers of all bus trips scheduled for the rest of the year. They talked about the upcoming senior picnic, the farmer's market tickets and she reminded everyone that Good Shepherd Church has a defensive driving course that they were asking for.

She also dropped off sign-up sheets for the free shots offered by Aikens Pharmacy. They are offering five shots this year. The seniors were reminded that if they want more than two shots, they should check with their healthcare provider.

Judy reached out to the Dispatch and she is very excited because the Warwick Dispatch agreed to put a listing of all senior groups in the paper, free of charge for the seniors. It will have times and places and contact numbers. This list should have been in yesterday's edition or if it wasn't, it'll be in next week's edition, August 20th publication.

She also asked them to run it again around the holidays. She also asked me to thank the Warwick Police Department on behalf of the Wednesday Senior Group. They not only provided a great barbecue for them but they gave such informative talk on scams, current scams and how to avoid scams and safe passcodes. Thank you, Police Chief and your department.

SUPERVISOR DWYER - All right, my report. We'll start off with some road work throughout the town. As Commissioner Astorino mentioned, we are in full swing with our culvert replacement project, actively replacing four culverts simultaneously. Hoyt Road is now open as of this afternoon. They finished that up with minor punch list items. We expect Ball Road to be open tomorrow, again with minor punch list items being done. Cascade Road, although we had to close a small section of Cascade Road, we had to close a section of the road by Brady where it intersects with Brady because we had a large crane that had to take all of the large pieces of the culvert and place them into the location. So that section was closed for about two and a half days. They were able to open up the section of Cascade Road this morning, and Cascade Road will remain open unless something unforeseen happens. But as of right now, Cascade Road is open on both sides of Cascade. Pumpkin Hill Road, that section of Pumpkin Hill and Route 17A is closed, and it will be closed probably until the end of August, but they're in full swing with that. So, the culvert projects are moving full steam ahead. Everything will be done by September 5th, and that is an assurance.

The state's DOT projects over the next one to two months, the State of New York will be working on the 94 Corridor paving project. The areas in the Village of Florida that they will

be working on is Willet Street, 94 in Meadow, 94 in Washington Ave, 94 between Bridge Street and Florida Green Drive. There will be daily lane closures for at least the next two to four weeks. In the Village of Florida, they'll be working on the intersection of 94 and West Street, and they will have night work lane closures.

That'll be for the next one to two weeks. In the Town of Warwick, near the area of Homestead Village Drive, there will be daily lane closures for the next three to five weeks. On 17A between South Street and Iron Forge Road, pavement repair resurfacing will be done over the next three to five weeks and then Route 94 from the New Jersey line to the Warwick Turnpike roadside, they will have roadside ditch cleaning and shaping for the next two to three weeks, and that's in preparation for the overall resurfacing of that corridor. The Town of Goshen is experiencing some serious delays over by Houston Road and Pulaski Highway. There is a one-lane street light that actually stops you, and I took it today, and it was probably a 10-minute time that it took. So, give yourself some extra time if you're traveling anywhere throughout or around Warwick, certainly a lot of delays. But just be mindful of workers that are in the streets, pedestrians, a lot of pedestrian crossings are impacted by this, and you've got a lot of DOT workers and town workers and contractors that are in the streets, and it doesn't seem like anybody pays attention when they're driving anymore. So, we hope that people can just give themselves a little more time and drive a little bit more carefully.

Mountain Lake Park, as Recreation Director mentioned, we are doing some infrastructure work up there. The water infiltration project has seen some roadblocks, but we are trying to move as quickly as we possibly can with that project. We will be starting the pool construction, the alterations and fixing of the old pools, as well as the construction of the new pool at Mountain Lake Park as soon as the pools are closed for the season.

The bike hike project, the biking component has been finished for a while, but the hiking component that connects Hickory Hills Golf Course with Cascade Road has been delayed because we're using very carefully selected logs to create the bridge that goes over Longhouse Creek. We were able to procure two of those logs, but one of them they simply couldn't find. We were able to get everything we needed this week. That project is right back on track, so I expect everything to be done with that project within the next couple of weeks, and Rec Director Walter and I and Ben will go out there and mark the trail, blaze the trail. Ben doesn't know, but he was volun-told that he's doing it. Yep, so that'll be great. We'll probably have a ribbon cutting or some grand opening for that trail beginning or middle of September when the weather cools down a little bit. It's going to be a great trail.

Wickham sewer, just a quick update. Last night as I was going to bed, I was scanning my e-mails and noticed that an e-mail came through with the draft IUP, which is the intended use plan. It is the biggest and most important document related to the sewer grant application, and one of the things that we did was an income survey for the sewer district to try to qualify for a certain measure within this IUP, and when I went to page 150 in this document, I found the Town of Warwick listed as meeting all the qualifications for not only the grants that we were looking to go for, doesn't mean that we're getting any grants, it just means that we met the qualifications to apply for these grants, and it also guarantees zero interest loan if we

need to borrow any money to cover for the project. A \$16 million project, you're talking hundreds of thousands of dollars for just interest alone on a project like that. So, we got great news last night. The work that we did qualified us for everything that we were hoping for, and at this point we just wait for the final IUP to come out after any public comment or scrutiny, and then we'll see where we are, but we did apply for the WQIP, which was due on July 15th, we met that deadline, got one of the biggest grants applications submitted, then we've got another one coming up September 1st, that's the WEIA grant, and that'll pretty much take care of all the grant applications that we can possibly apply for this year.

Jayne Street Bridge, slow and steady, continues to be in the design phase, hoping that we can get the design done toward the winter, go out to bid and start the work hopefully next year, but not making any promises, but that's certainly the goals that we're setting.

As Director Walter mentioned, we conducted a survey of the town to try to identify and gauge the level of interest in a multi-use community rink. We have right now a roller hockey rink at Town Park off of Union Corners Road. It's in disrepair, it needs a lot of attention, needs a lot of work, so we saw it as a good opportunity to apply for grants and really reinvent this complex, reinvent this rink, and turn it from a seasonal part-time roller hockey rink into a full year-round multi-use roller hockey as well as ice hockey rink that can be used 12 months out of the year. Our grant writers sent us a grant called the New York Bricks Grant. It's a New York State grant, it's brand new, it's never been done before. Huge pool of money out there for communities to expand outdoor as well as recreational opportunities for communities. Recreational opportunities for communities. So, we're applying for \$3.8 million for this complex that again will be a 12-month facility that will offer both ice skating as well as roller skating. So, we're very excited about that. Great job, Sam and team. We have a great team that's working on this project in particular, some members of the public that are interested in this as well. The survey feedback really came back overwhelmingly positive. I didn't expect that volume of responses, so that was really great and that really will help us in our application, so worked out very well.

Happy to report that the Pine Island Tennis and Pickleball Courts have been re-stripped. That project is finished. Last, over the weekend, I think there was still tape up. I don't know if it's open yet, but we'll check. Is it open Ben?

DPW COMMISSIONER BENJAMIN ASTORINO – Yes, it is opened and they are playing on it.

SUPERVISOR DWYER - Maybe we did not open it, maybe someone opened it, but whatever, it's done and we opened it. So it came out really, really great, so we hope that the entire town, that's a town park, not just for Pine Island, that's an entire town park, we hope that everybody enjoys the new Pickleball and Tennis Courts in Pine Island Park. We have begun the process to work with our unions within the town.

We met with the PBA this week to start working on the contract for 2026. Next week, we're going to meet with the CSEA, which covers DPW, as well as our other town hall employees and Dial-A-Bus, and we'll meet with them to go over their contract. And to add more fun to

the puzzle, we've got to do our recycling contract as well this year, so we're going to have to go out to bid for recycling. So, all of those things are going to happen as we are in the process for budget season, so working hard and really a lot going on.

Let us see, what else do we have here? August 19th is our senior barbecue that is going to be at Town Park. It is free for any Town of Warwick senior citizen. What is that, 55 and older now? Is that what they are calling seniors? It does not make sense to me, but 55 and older, you are eligible to go to our senior barbecue free, and you will find many of the elected officials will be there serving hot dogs, serving chicken. Our town DPW commissioner and police chief will be on hand, so anyone who'd like to interact with us and meet with us and hear from us, we will be there all day serving hot dogs and chicken and come up to us and talk to us. So, if you want tickets to go to the event, you can stop in the Supervisor's Office any day between now and then. So, Friday and Monday, we are located at 132 Kings Highway between the hours of 8:30 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. every day, and you get your free tickets to the senior barbecue.

The Town of Warwick has five applications right now that will be going for PDR funding. We will not mention the specific ones just yet. At the next town board meeting, we are going to do some seeker and environmental review work on these, but we are working very hard to make sure that we are keeping a lot of progress with our PDR and open space program. So fortunately, Orange County has opened up a 50% match for open space and community preservation, and it seems like it is a much simpler and simplified process, less rigorous criteria to be eligible for funding than what the federal government has previously done. So, it's created a very good window of opportunity for some farms and some open space properties, which may not have met all of the requirements previously. It gives them a greater access and opportunity to apply for funding. So, we're working with the county on a lot of these applications, but we have five active right now. That concludes my report, and at this time, we will open it up to the privilege of the floor on any agenda item. Any agenda items, questions.


