REPORTS OF BOARDS AND DEPARTMENT HEADS:

POLICE CHIEF RADER- Thank you, Mr. Supervisor. Just a quick report tonight. Applefest was this past Sunday. It was very well attended. I want to thank and commend the officers from our department, as well as the support we received from local, county, and state agencies. The safety and security plan is a big undertaking for an event of this size, and all the efforts that were put forward as well when we kept it a safe day.

A little announcement to do with the village. Their new skate park is set to open on October 18th. It is mostly completed, and we're getting a lot of anxious people using that park instead of the old park. The village has requested that our units assigned there could move them back to the other park. So, I just figured if I announce it here, if anyone's watching and you know where they dropped their kids off, it's best to drop them off at the skate park.

Last Wednesday, the police department received the Orange County Executives' Meritorious Service Medal for our efforts at the Jennings Creek fire. Last November, I just wanted to bring that to the board's attention. We're honored and humbled by the presentation that they made.

This past Saturday, our retired K-9, Nicky, passed away at the age of 16. Most dogs of that breed last 8 to 10 years, so Nicky had 16 good years. He was assigned to Officer Halsey from

2012 to 2021. And he was a very active dog during those times, one of the hardest workers we had in the department during those nine years.

And lastly, I would like to just read a letter that we received from the Pine Island Ambulance Corps commending our officers for the actions on a recent call.

I'm writing this letter of commendation to formally recognize the outstanding actions of Sergeant Kearns and Officer McNamara during a recent cardiac arrest. Upon arrival, Sergeant Kearns and Officer McNamara immediately assessed the situation and began life-saving measures without hesitation. Their swift response, calm under pressure, and dedication to duty exemplified the highest standards of this department and the policing profession. Through their coordinated efforts with EMS, the patient was given the greatest possible chance of survival. Their professionalism, quick thinking, and compassion reflect great credit upon themselves and serve as an excellent example of what it means to go above and beyond in service for our community. It is with sincere appreciation that I commend Sergeant Kearns and Officer McNamara for their exceptional performance. Their actions on that day embody the values of courage, integrity, and service that define this department. And that was from Second Lieutenant and EMT Liam Kohler.

That's all I have unless there's any questions from the board.

SUPERVISOR DWYER- Any questions from the board? Just want to clarify the reason that the county did that commendation this time so long after the fire was because they do it once a year and October is before November and that's why it took them so long to do it. But congratulations to you and the department on earning that recognition.

POLICE CHIEF RADER - Thank you.

DPW COMMISSIONER ASTORINO- Good evening, everyone. Our paving is completed for the Town of Warwick this year. We just have one road with some edges we're going to do Round Hill Road. Our line striping program has been completed. We did do some work on Sleepy Valley Road. We did some ditching, replaced 80 feet of 15-inch driveway pipe, cleaned up some ditches up there.

We are repairing some basins. We did Meadow Ridge Road. We did two basins there. Windmill Lane we did two basins. Panorama Drive we did a basin out there. We are ditching Amity Road and, as I said, Sleepy Valley Road.

The potholes are still being fixed. Our trucks are being prepped for the winter. As we speak, it will all be inspected. Probably towards the end of the month, we'll watch the weather and wing plows be put on. We're also going to go out with a road mower, with a boom mower, continuously mowing that on a daily basis. So, like I said, our salt is filled up right now. We have a new salt vendor this year, Appalachia Salt. Hopefully they work better than they had last year. And we'll be prepping for the winter months very shortly. Any questions?

SUPERVISOR DWYER- Any questions?

TOWN CLERK ASTORINO- I have a question. When do you plan on closing the bathrooms at the town parks?

DPW COMMISSIONER ASTORINO Probably November. We want to wait for the soccer and the games to be all done. That's usually early to mid-November.

TOWN CLERK ASTORINO - Thank you.

DPW COMMISSIONER ASTORINO - We'll let you know then.

TOWN CLERK ASTORINO - That's an important question.

SUPERVISOR DWYER- That's a good question. We were getting calls today about when our summer water gets shut off, so people are going to start wondering.

DPW COMMISSIONER MCPHERSON- Good evening. Brief report tonight. Our guys finished reading at all water districts. We had some assistance from our new guy, our new part timer, who's been a great help lightening the load. That worked out well so far. Our guys fixed two leaks on the Greenwood Lake Summer System. One on Indian Trail North, one on Deer Trail South. And we'll be shutting that summer water down next Wednesday,

October 15th for the season. It might take a day or two to run out once we shut it off, but October 15th is the date.

Just to mention again, we're planning right now to flush all hydrants in all districts the last week of October, the 27th to the 31st. We're tentative on that right now. I'll let you know by our date, but that's what we're planning for right now.

Price Chopper Wastewater Plant, we budgeted to do some upgrades. That included replacing some sand filter media as well as some electrical upgrades, and all those have been completed, and that plant is in good shape. The main wastewater plant, our guys continue to make small repairs and do maintenance to keep the plant going to the best of its ability while we continue to work with the engineers toward our goal of the plant upgrade. That concludes my report.

SUPERVISOR DWYER -Any questions for Matt? Thank you, Matt.

RECREATION DIRECTOR WALTER- Thank you, Supervisor. My report is mainly about Mountain Lake Park. It's still busy with fall events happening, and lots of folks are getting out and playing pickleball or hiking the trails.

I've seen a lot of activity at the new trail, the Cascade Long House Creek Trail, which is great. Just wanted to caution folks that as leaves come down, the trail can get slippery, especially over rocks. Sometimes the leaves will hide roots and things like that on the trail, so just take your time and enjoy your hike.

Also, we have some upcoming plays at the park. It's Core Theatre Group play called Sweeney Todd. It's a spooky thriller for the fall season. Performances are October 17th at 7 p.m., October 18th at 2 p.m. and 8 p.m., and October 19th at 3 p.m. So, if you want some more information about tickets, you can go on to Core Theatre Group's website.

Work on the arts building is starting back up, and they're making progress, which is great. There are some large piles of gravel towards that end of the park, but hopefully those will be in the hole soon and things will look better. But the theater's open, the arts building's open, so things are heading in the right direction now, which is great.

The construction on the pool should start next week, hopefully and that's it for my report.

SUPERVISOR DWYER- Thank you for all your patience during this unbelievable project that we're undertaking up there. Much-needed project, but a very, very difficult and challenging one, so thank you for all your extra work. Any questions for Sam?

COUNCILMAN KOWAL - Do you have any specific dates in mind to close the pickleball courts, or just as long as the weather prevails?

RECREATIONAL DIRECTOR WALTER- As long as the weather prevails. So some people can still come out when it's cold, but again, those could be slippery in the mornings with the dew, so I would just wait until things dry up a little bit.

SUPERVISOR DWYER - Okay, great. Thank you.

COUNCILMAN DEANGELO - Okay, good evening. For the Humane Society, the Warwick Humane Society welcomes two new staff members to help care for the community's homeless pets. They are still seeking one more local person with a passion for animals to complete their team. They must be 21 years or older, clean background and driver's license, able to work long hours, including weekends and holidays, and lift 50-plus pounds as needed. The animal care position includes feeding, cleaning, medicating, and socializing/training. You send a resume to warwickhumane@yahoo.com. She wants to thank those who have been able to supply donations received since the last meeting. The equine pine pellet bedding is always needed and can be purchased at Wadeson's Home Center or Tractor Supply as a single bag or by the pallet. There have been several recent bite reports received by Animal Control. Be sure to keep all dogs, cats, and ferrets up to date on a rabies vaccination to avoid quarantine if a bite occurs. New York State mandates that all dogs must be licensed with the Town Clerk on a yearly basis. Up-to-date rabies vaccinations protect family, friends, neighbors, and pets, and the licensing is the accepted proof of ownership. The supplies they need is alfalfa hay for 14 rabbits available for adoption, equine pine pellet bedding for litter for over 150 cats and kittens, and bleach for laundry and disinfecting the kennels of 24 dogs.

As far as the Friendly Visitor Program goes, the number of neighbors visited in September was 24, the total number of volunteers assisting those neighbors was 20, and the total number of services provided by the volunteers is 171, which is incredible. Those 20 people did 171 services. There will be volunteer training for the Friendly Visitor Program on two dates, October 16th at 5 p.m. and October 28th at 5 p.m. Now, these are virtual training dates. Preapproval is required to attend the training, so you have to contact them at 845-341-1173. Extension 305, and that's all I have.

SUPERVISOR DWYER - Thank you.

SUPERVISOR DWYER - It's been a very busy couple of weeks for me and for a lot of us, dealing with contract negotiations, budget work, and wrapping up some of the big projects that's included over the last couple weeks. One update on the DOT road work, we did provide an extension of the DOT to continue working in the area of Pennings and Vernon so that they could try to wrap up that section of paving and road work before the end of the year, and then they'll be able to move on to the roundabout in the spring of 2026. We did speak with Steve Pennings, the owner of Pennings, and he was also in the same mindset that we want to try to get this project out of that area. We do not want to restart again in the same area. Obviously, this will be weather dependent, but the goal of the contractor and the DOT is to have that section of Route 94 paved from the New Jersey border down to basically ShopRite-Price Chopper Interstate, and they're hoping to accomplish that by the end of this year, and again, that's weather dependent.

The Village of Warwick has ongoing overnight construction at the intersection of West and Main Street, so just expect some delays there. They're trying to obviously do it overnight so that they're not competing with all the traffic that goes through that intersection during the day. We understand that it's an inconvenience to those who live in that area, but again, these projects need to move on and move out, so we're trying to do everything we can.

The Village of Florida is dealing with some significant traffic issues and a lot of traveling issues related to the work that's going on there. It seems that the project was a little bit behind schedule. They're trying to accomplish a lot in a very short period of time before the weather window closes, and there's a lot of work that needs to happen in the Village of Florida and the Village of Warwick, so they want to try to get as much work done as possible so that they can get a jump start on starting in the spring of next year. So there's a lot of traffic. The Village of Florida has been doing a very good job communicating with the public on what information they're getting, but just like us, it's very difficult to get information from the DOT, so we have to rely on information from the contractor, but oftentimes the contractor is limited in what they can say to even municipalities. So, we're all trying to work with the best information possible, and sometimes that information is not the best for us or the best for residents. So, traveling through the Village of Warwick and the Village of Florida has been restricted a bit. We appreciate everybody's patience, and I think everyone is on the same page that this work needed to be done, and we're going to have to deal with a little bit of pain before it gets any better.

Sam mentioned the work at Mountain Lake Park. We are moving back on track with the water infiltration project. We did some waterproofing there, and now they're going to do some of the drainage work that needed to happen, and again, this was to protect the infrastructure at this park and the buildings that we use for facility rentals, both for not-for-profits and for profit purposes. We have schools renting this. We have theater companies renting this. We've got some great shows and great plays coming up at the Mountain Lake Park Theater. So we want to try to protect this investment as much as we possibly can.

The Wickham Sewer District grant announcements are scheduled to be published in both November and December, and obviously the Town Board is waiting on getting those announcements before we make any decision on how we proceed with the Wickham Sewer District upgrade project, and we'll certainly let the public know as soon as we get more information.

Jayne Street Bridge in the Village of Florida continues to undergo design work and surveying and land acquisition that will be needed for that improvement project. Again, we got a full grant to cover the cost of the Jayne Street Bridge replacement project, but unfortunately, it's a state-funded grant, and we have to follow the timeline that is set by the state and the DOT, and that also means that all specifications for the design and the construction must meet DOT and federal guidelines. So, it makes the project a little more expensive and certainly drags it on versus if we were to spend town money, but at the end of the day, property taxes are not paying for this. State taxes will be and federal dollars will be.

We had a meeting last week with what will be the first affordable lot subdivision project in the Town of Warwick since having this law in effect in over 22 years. The newspaper published my quote of, I threw out a number that was an estimate, but it seems that they took it as a fact. The actual number for the affordable lot will be closer to \$380,000, so a home in this particular subdivision could go from anywhere between \$800,000 to \$1.1 million. The affordable lot will have to be sold for no more than \$380,000 if that were to happen today. This number is tied to interest rates, so that could fluctuate as this happens. The first affordable lot is scheduled to be constructed in 2027. The town will begin the affordable lot lottery in the early part of 2026. You can check the town code, just search affordable lot, and you will get more information on who would qualify for the affordable lot. We'll be publishing in the early part of January, February, all of the details on this lottery and who qualifies and how you can enter into it and every other detail you could possibly need for this. So, stay tuned, pay attention. You could potentially land yourself a \$900,000 house for \$380,000. This one subdivision in particular will be offering three of the affordable lots, and we've got another subdivision that's currently in the works that will have one. So, potentially four affordable lots as part of this law on our books could be forthcoming within the next couple of years.

Tomorrow we have a company coming in to do the feasibility study for solar. We had talked about it at our last Town Board Meeting. The Town Board authorized me to enter into an agreement with a company that is state-funded that will, at no cost to the Town of Warwick, do a feasibility study and analyze whether or not solar would make sense for us and whether or not it would be cost-effective. So, we're going to start that process tomorrow.

The Town of Warwick is going to engage a law firm for a class-action lawsuit against some chemical manufacturers for PFAS, and PFOS in some of our water systems. Currently we are not above the limits that are set by the state. However, there is no PFOS that is acceptable in our drinking water, so we will make every effort to remove any possible evidence of PFOS,

and we will also be joining in a class-action lawsuit that has the potential to pay for and reimburse the town for any costs associated with the removal of PFOS.

I mentioned to the Town Board, we've been working on an initiative with our Climate Smart Committee and Sustainable Warwick to look at composting, more of a town-wide composting initiative. Right now there's a very successful small-scale composting both in the Warwick Farmer's Market and the Greenwood Lake Lakeside Farmer's Market, and they've been doing a really good job. So we've done it at a small scale very successfully. We are going to take a tour of some bigger-scale composting facilities in the New Paltz area and see how they're doing it, how much it costs, and what the benefit to the town is. I see this as a major cost savings for some of our businesses, and if we can incorporate the school districts to begin a large-scale composting operation, that could have the potential result of lowering school taxes because of the amount of carting and the carting costs associated with just taking and transporting school lunches and other scraps that could otherwise be composted. So we're going to take a look at this. We're going to tour some facilities and begin a feasibility study on whether or not composting would make sense for the Town of Warwick at a larger-scale level. That concludes my report for now.
