REPORTS OF BOARDS AND DEPARTMENT HEADS:

POLICE CHIEF JOHN RADER – Good evening, I have a brief report. A reminder to the residents, the overnight parking rules in the Village of Warwick and Town of Warwick will go into effect on November 1st. The Town, from 11-1 to 4-1, so November 1st to April 1st, there is no overnight parking on town roads during inclement weather. The Village, from November 1st to April 1st, there is no overnight parking on any village streets at any time.

The annual Halloween Parade in the Village of Warwick will be held on Friday, October 31st, with the lineup beginning at 4:30 p.m. on High Street. The parade will kick off at 5:00 p.m. It will end on Railroad Avenue. Following that, they've closed Oakland Court, Welling Avenue, Orchard Street, and Linden Place from 4:00 p.m. to 9:00 p.m. for trick-or-treating.

The Halloween curfews, I know the Town has on the agenda for tonight, but just a reminder for the Village, from 9:00 p.m. on Thursday, October 30th until 6:00 a.m. Friday, October 31st, and then again on Friday from 9:00 p.m. to 6:00 a.m. on Saturday. The Town will be from 8:00 p.m. on Thursday, October 30th until 6:00 a.m. on Friday, and then again October 31st, Friday night to 6:00 a.m. on Saturday, November 1st. This curfew applies to anyone under the age of 18, that is not, unless they are accompanied by an adult. That's my report.

DPW COMMISSIONER, BENJAMIN ASTORINO – Good evening, everyone. We did install an 18-inch by 16-foot culvert pipe on Cedar Hill Drive. We also replaced a 24" by 24" catch basin in the same location. On Sleepy Valley Road, we repaired a box culvert.

On Lower Wisner Road, we repaired a box culvert. We were ditching roadsides on Spanktown and Sleepy Valley roads. We did some work with O&R. We cleaned up a tree that came down the wires on Conklin Road. Our ballfields are open. We're mowing and maintaining. We will be blowing out the irrigation soon before the winter weather sets in. Potholes are filled with hot mix. Vehicle maintenance, all our trucks are being inspected. We should be done by the middle of next week. Probably by the end of next week, the wing plows will be installed on the trucks. We did have not one, but two water breaks on Jersey Avenue, and that was handled. Any questions?

WATER & SEWER, DEPUTY COMMISSIONER MATTHEW MCPHERSON – Absent.

RECREATION DIRECTOR, SAM WALTER – Thanks, Supervisor. So, the arts building is continuing to have work done on it, and things are progressing really well. They're moving along now at a good pace. They said the job is about two or three more weeks until it's finished, which would be awesome.

They started construction on a new wading pool, and that looks amazing. So, if you get a chance to come by the park and see that, I would encourage you to do that. They're also repairing the crowning on the two main pools at the park. That's going well, too.

For the park staff, we've been busy winterizing the cabins, and there's quite a bit of work to be done with that for the winter. We do keep the apartments open, and obviously the lodge and the arts building and the theater all stay open for winter. The small cabins get closed down for winter.

Pickleball, I know that we talked about that a little bit at the last meeting. We do have to take some of the things down, like the windscreen nettings along the fence. We put the better nets away and take out the older nets that are more portable and can be stored in a bag if the weather gets really bad. The new nets will go away pretty soon to protect them for each season, and the older nets will still be out there for a while.

Upcoming events, Sustainable Warwick has organized a guided hike on the new hiking trail this Saturday. We'll be starting at Hickory Hill Golf Course and then going to Cascade. The start time is 3:00 p.m. If you want to go in one direction, it's about two miles, a little over two miles in one direction. You have to remember to bring water, hiking boots, a trekking pole. If you need it, it's a moderate hike, and I'll be leading the hike. So, if you want to come out, we'll have some fun hiking on Saturday. On Sunday, the Warwick Valley Gardeners are having their wine and cheese tasting event at the lodge at the park. That starts at 2:00 p.m., and I heard that there's still tickets available to get, or you can buy tickets at the door. That's a great event to support the Gardeners that do so much around the community. That's it.

SUPERVISOR DWYER - Any questions for Sam? Thank you, Sam.

TOWN BOARD REPORTS:

COUNCILMAN DEANGELO - Okay, good evening. The Animal Shelter Appreciation Week is November 2nd through November 8th, and the Warwick Valley Humane Society invites the community to their open house at the Animal Shelter on November 8th for 1:00 p.m. until 3:00 p.m. for cider and cookies. Meet the staff and animals, and walk through the facility.

COUNCILMAN KOWAL - No report.

COUNCILMAN SHUBACK - First of all, I would like to give a shout-out to the Florida Fire Department. They had a fire in the Village of Florida the other night, and they had a nice save. One of the warehouses off of Roosevelt Ave. in the village, dumpsters caught fire, and part of the building started catching fire. The Fire Department got there quick and put out the fire with very little damage to the building. Also, too, the Fire Department will be having a Halloween event. There's usually a little parade, and then they have donuts and cider and contests back at the firehouse. That's on Halloween, too.

TOWN CLERK ASTORINO - I really don't have too much to say except that early voting begins on Saturday. It will be right here at Town Hall from 9:00 p.m. to 5:00 p.m. It's also Sunday, 9:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. You can call my office at 845-986-1124, extension 248. If you need help finding your district or where you have to vote, we can assist you. Also, you can get a list. I'll put the list of all the different—I think there's seven or eight different places you can vote early voting, Monroe, Middletown. So, if you're out shopping and it's more convenient, you can stop at those places during early voting. You can vote anywhere in Orange County. If you don't vote during early voting, you have to vote at your polling site on Election Day, and that's where, if you don't know where it is, you can call us, and we'll let you know and we'll figure it out. That's really all I have to say.

Oh, also, the DMPs, you can pick them up if you're a hunter. The leftovers, we start selling them November 1st.

SUPERVISOR DWYER - Just want to clarify, early voting is at the Senior Center, not at Town Hall, but it's a part of Town Hall complex located at 132 Kings Highway. Thank you, Madam Clerk.

SUPERVISOR DWYER - Just a quick update on the DOT road work. As the cold weather starts to roll in, the road work will start to wind down, but it will get busier before it ends, I can assure you of that. The contractors are working very hard to try to wrap up the project, at least to get to a point where they're comfortable before the winter comes in. I spoke with the contractor this morning, and they confirmed that they will be paving the section between New Jersey and Galloway Road no, not Galloway Road, between New Jersey and Pennings. That'll take place starting probably next Wednesday through the following week, and they'll also be paving Galloway Road from Iron Forge Road to basically the Country Club intersection of Route 94. They still have some milling to do between tomorrow and Monday, and as soon as that milling is done, they might have to do some repair work on Route 94, and they're going to start paving right away. So, the goal is to get that section paved and get them out of that entire area so that they can focus on the roundabout at the intersection of Route 94 and County Route 1. They are still working aggressively in the Villages of Warwick and Florida, trying to button up some of the sidewalks. Especially as the weather gets colder, it's harder to pour concrete and have it set effectively. So, they are working very hard around the clock to try to get this project done, and we want to encourage them to get in and get out as fast as possible. But we understand that there's a big inconvenience with this, and we know

that we have to feel some more pain before we feel the benefits of this paving project. So, hang tight. It'll be over soon, and then we'll be dealing with snow.

As Recreation Director Walter mentioned, the water infiltration project is moving full steam ahead, thankfully, after some delays. And the Mountain Lake Park pool construction project is also well underway and making a lot of really great progress. So, we're very appreciative of the hard work going on there.

This winter's project for me and the Recreation Director is to execute our Townwide Park Master Plan. That's going to be a huge priority where we will be relying on the public's feedback to get some answers and opinions on what everyone wants to see coming out of their town parks. So, we're going to use some of the great tools we've employed already on getting public feedback, some of the community surveys, and we're going to put together a comprehensive Townwide Master Plan, and hopefully we'll have it done by the spring. That's the goal.

We had a solar company, basically solar engineers, come in and do a feasibility study on the town properties last week. They gave me a preliminary report for today's meeting that was just basically verbal, saying that initial indications show that it would be very beneficial and cost-effective to have solar on some of the buildings located in the town hall complex, including the DPW and the town hall building. So, they're going to continue to move forward on that and give us more information as we get a little bit further in the process. But I did want to update the Board that the preliminary data and information that we got back and the feedback was very positive.

We are going to execute a contract tonight to enter into an agreement with Arcadia, a community solar initiative, that will have the immediate benefit of saving 10 percent of our electricity or utility bill. This is a very interesting concept that I believe was brought to my attention by Mr. Helm. We thank you for coming to all of our Town Board Meetings and bringing us great initiatives and ideas, but really the benefit of this is that the town doesn't have to invest any money. We don't have to do any work. We just have to enter into an agreement and commit to utilize X number of kilowatt hours' worth of energy over the next five years, and I think we'll have no problem doing that with the amount of energy that we use in our town buildings. But we will see an immediate savings of 10 percent. And, Michael, thank you so much for bringing that to our attention and really moving that along. It's a great benefit for the taxpayers, and we really appreciate it.

Pine Island Water District is continuing to move forward. I have to execute an easement with a neighbor, which basically just ensures that they comply with not discharging any oil or chemicals in the easement area, which is roughly 100 feet surrounding the well site. So, I'll be meeting with the neighbor probably tomorrow to start the process of securing an easement to make sure that we can get that well online. We will begin the process of an income survey for the Pine Island Water District to attempt to get some grant funding to make some much-needed upgrades in that district.

We had a tour today. Deputy Supervisor Kowal and myself and Michael Helm and some other folks that are involved in the Climate Smart Committee, we went up to New Paltz and

we toured some facilities, some composting facilities, because we've mentioned ideas about possibly having a larger-scale composting initiative within a town, and the only way to really see if that would make sense is by seeing it firsthand and seeing the ways that it works and learning some lessons from situations where it didn't work so well. And very informative meetings. We visited three different sites, three different composting sites today throughout the New Paltz area. I think we have a few more that we need to look at, like the Town of Bethlehem up by Albany is another one, a great town-run example of a composting site. But really just investigating the opportunity, investigating the benefits, the cost benefits of doing something like this, how would it improve the quality of life of our residents and possibly save some money. If we can bring businesses online to help dispose some of their waste without paying a carter to do it or possibly have some benefit with the school district where they can reduce their costs of garbage and recycling. One of the interesting things I learned today was that one of the composting sites we visited, each of the colleges in that area drop off, what was it, how many tons? There were so many statistics today. Yeah, too many numbers were thrown today, but I think there are four colleges in that area and each of them are disposing their waste, their compostable food scraps at this site. So, I can only imagine the savings that they're seeing by doing this and then it turns into usable topsoil and dirt that can be used in local gardens, household gardens and other needed areas. So just doing some research on this and seeing if it would make sense for the Town of Warwick.

I updated the Town Board on our current budget status and the work that we've been doing to try to get to a reasonable number. We continue to work very hard to make sure that by the time of the public hearing, we have a very responsible budget that's able to meet the needs of the town and maintain the essential services that we are obligated to provide for our town residents.

In the month of November, we're going to go out to bid for essentially all services that are contracted with the Town of Warwick. That includes plumbing, HVAC, electric, you name it. We're going to go out to bid for everything and try to get competitive pricing on every single service that is provided to the Town of Warwick. So, if you are a service provider that might be able to provide a service to the Town of Warwick, check our website about the middle of November and you will see bid opportunities for each of the contracts that the town provides.

Right now, we have roughly seven applicants that are seeking PDR funding, and we are working with each of them to see if they would fit and qualify for matching or full funding from either federal or state. We're working very hard to see if we can process that and continue the efforts of PDR throughout the Town of Warwick.

We've got just a couple more events that I don't know if were mentioned, but the Irish Festival and a 5K at Wickham Woodlands Park from 9:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. this Sunday. Yes. Also, that same day, Warwick Cares is hosting a mental health and fair at Winstanley Park in the Village of Greenwood Lake. This is being run by Ina Sellier. She is a local high school student, and she is trying to bring this mental health fair to the Village of Greenwood Lake and supporting the entire Town of Warwick. So, I would encourage stopping by either one of those great community events. And again, the mental health fair is going to be from

11:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m. in Winstanley Park in the Village of Greenwood Lake. That concludes my report.

PRIVILEGE OF THE FLOOR (AGENDA ITEMS)

MICHAEL HELM - I want to thank Jesse and the town for jumping on the community solar option. It is a good way to take advantage of one of the opportunities in New York State to help develop clean energy while saving money. Also, I read the very last resolution, and I've got a couple of wording adjustments that I hope you'll consider for the final resolution. So instead of for a term of five years, I think it should say an initial term of five years. Because it could go on.

SUPERVISOR DWYER - I'll just mention that the agreement that we're signing is for a term of five years. And at that point, if we want to extend it, we would just have to enter into a new agreement.

MICHAEL HELM - So, the copy that I looked at, which may be different from the final one, said, unless you jump up and say, unless you jump up at the fourth year and say we're backing out, unless you go one year in advance notice, it's just going to keep going.

SUPERVISOR DWYER - So maybe we could just strike the term of five years, enter into an agreement with community solar. Right?

MICHAEL HELM - Or we could just say an initial term of five years or enter into an agreement would also be fine. And another thing, I think it's better to say saving 10% of electricity costs in specified accounts. Because it's not going to cover all the electricity accounts, it's just certain ones. So, it better be 10% of those accounts.

SUPERVISOR DWYER - the fact that what we got was 10% of our overall Electricity. I don't even think we need to necessarily say that at all because it's not really relevant to the contract.

MICHAEL HELM - It would just cover 30% of the town's electricity. And we may be able to get other accounts added to that. But the initial contract, at least I was able to, was only going to cover 30% of the town's usage.

SUPERVISOR DWYER - Okay. That was it?

MICHAEL HELM - That's it.

SUPERVISOR DWYER - Great. Thank you, Michael.
