Grove and I would not want to see that happen here. 1 Even though they say it's going to be a 2 school for 200 students, I don't know that it's going 3 to be that. 4 THE CHAIRMAN: Well, I will say this, and I 5 haven't commented much on the comments, we will not 6 act on hypotheticals. We cannot. 7 The one gentleman that was just here about 8 the safeguards, that's what we're here for. We follow 9 10 the code. There is a code that is in place for the 11 Town of Warwick that every resident was involved in or 12 should have been involved in. And we followed that. 1.3 That's why we have our professionals. 14 But to say hypotheticals, we can do that on 15 a 40-lot subdivision that comes by this Board. And if 16 they don't do this, it's a site plan. 17 MS. DONNA DOUGLAS: Right. 18 THE CHAIRMAN: And they have to adhere to 19 the site plan period. 20 That's why we have safeguards in our 21 22 community. I get it. MS. DONNA DOUGLAS: 23 THE CHAIRMAN: That's for everybody. 24

L2	volunteer fireman in Rockland County, South Spring
Ľ3	Valley and neighboring Spring Valley.
l 4	Many of you might be familiar, five years
15	ago there was a fire that took the life of Jared Lloyd
16	in a 200-person facility in Spring Valley that was
17	poorly maintained that was undergoing religious
18	practices in their kitchen. That kitchen fire took a
19	life that's never been repaid.
20	What stops this facility from having a
21	kitchen fire of the same cause? What stops this
22	facility from being the next victim to a Greenwood
23	Lake fireman, Tuxedo fireman or the required mutual

aid departments that would have to come in to field

this type of fire should it catch?

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1	There is no answer to that. That's why it
2	shouldn't exist.
3	THE CHAIRMAN: August Malillo. August?
4	August?
5	MR. AUGUST MALILLO: August Malillo;
6	Homestead Village.
7	Kind of unprepared but there was a lot said
8	here. One of the things was the gentleman from HAR,
9	I'm not sure what that acronym stands for. He spoke a
10	lot about what NYU did, which he didn't speak anything
11	about going forward with this project.
12	I'm afraid of people that constantly
13	misrepresent themselves.
14	THE CHAIRMAN: I can assure you, Mr. Musso
15	didn't misrepresent himself.
16	UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Say that again.
17	MR. AUGUST MALILLO: No, not him. I'm
18	talking about going forward.
19	THE CHAIRMAN: You mean NYU?
20	MR. AUGUST MALILLO: No, NYU is a very
21	reputable organization. They were like good
22	THE CHAIRMAN: They did what they had to do.

14	UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: I yield my time to
15	Danielle Sinisi.
16	THE CHAIRMAN: Danielle.
17	MS. DANIELLE SINISI: If that's okay. Thank
18	you.
19	THE CHAIRMAN: Can you spell your name?
20	MS. DANIELLE SINISI: D-A-N-I-E-L-L-E-S-I-N-
21	I-S-I.
22	THE CHAIRMAN: Thank you.
23	MS. DANIELLE SINISI: So I'm a Warwick
24	resident, I'm a substitute teacher and a former school
25	bus driver for the District.

So what I wanted to say was we have school buses that have driven on these roads for many years and I know how tight some of these roads can be, just making it through.

The idea of pedestrians on trails, on roads, is more concerning to me than the studies you've talked about. I do not see that working out well.

And I also am concerned with the environmental impact. But my experience with the drivers unfortunately from Kiryas Joel have been overcrowded buses and illegal practices, speeding on highways, and I've had to report them multiple times as they passed me driving a school bus in dangerous ways.

I would like to know how do we ensure the safety of the people in that community, the drivers on that tight road, and the people who are pedestrians?

Also, I would like to state that I did not know about this hearing much ahead of time. I would have signed up myself. I appreciate --

THE CHAIRMAN: We got you here.

MS. DANIELLE SINISI: I appreciate the yield.

But we need our community to be heard. We need to make sure that when there's important issues

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like this that every member of our community knows about it and that they have the chance to speak on it and study it ahead of time. And I feel a lot of people felt like they didn't know about it. And I don't know why but I think that that's something that we need to make sure that we hear them now. And if they are -- and I realize you guys are trying, I do.

But if they are signing petitions and they are studying and they are trying to get their voices heard, I just want to make sure that everybody has that voice.

THE CHAIRMAN: Thank you.

MS. DANIELLE SINISI: Thank you guys.

THE CHAIRMAN: Brenda Wiley.

MS. BRENDA WILEY: I tried to add it in.

Good evening, everyone. My name is Brenda Wiley. I am a resident of the Village of Greenwood Lake.

I'm going to read this because I actually kept editing it. Having grown up in Rockland County, Sterling Forest has been a wonderful preserved mecca for me and my family for decades. It is where I learned to ski, hike and experience the outdoor beauty and it's where I rescued my first little critter.

I am here this evening as I have grave

concerns which I will reiterate should this project be approved how it could potentially impact the following:

The environment, the ecological system of protected habitats; pollution; the potential need for increased emergency services and agency support in the event of a natural disaster; invasive species which can be — which can fuel in the event of a fire; increased resources, such as state park staff, off-site improvements, including fire hydrants, additional sewers, traffic lights, roadway repairs; additional funding and plans to control traffic flow and parking lot shortages at the nearby visitor center.

Further, I strongly feel that while the need for higher education is important, this project should not be in the center of a protected state park nor at the expense of taxpayers footing the bill, especially if an entity plans to possibly classify as a non-profit.

Hold on. Okay. This could be detrimental to nearby communities for many of the reasons I have mentioned.

My questions are what standards and reasonable conditions for the college that they will

have to comply with? Will there be a time line or schedule for inspections to ensure that all is safe with zone capacity of the buildings and fire safety, water pollution, et cetera?

And, lastly, who will be responsible for monitoring and enforcing the anticipated 200 campus residents?

Let's not reverse what took over a decade to put in place to protect this state park.

It is imperative that a Full Environmental Impact Study happens. Thank you.

THE CHAIRMAN: Thank you.

Steph Kowalsky.

MS. STEPH KOWALSKY: Hi. I don't think I'm going to need three minutes.

So I came with the intent to just listen. I don't need another cause. I'm not always received very well. I'm very direct and to the point.

I was lucky to get a seat right in front next to the representatives for this project, who have sat here this whole time scoffing, laughing with each other, making comments. And now they're just jotting down things to make it look like everyone who has an opinion or an objection is antisemitic, squaring it out in dark letters.

And I hear everyone mentioning an Article
78. I have no idea what that is but it really sounds
like people have been speaking to attorneys and
representation on both sides. There's a lawsuit
coming from one side or the other, and I just hope the
Town is really doing their part to prevent that, and
our taxpayer dollars from paying for that litigation.

But also I'm just concerned with the word
"student," adult male. Like are these students? Are
they age 17 to 21? Are they older? Like what kind of
school is this? And if they are older, another
project going on in Florida, everybody was asking that
background checks were done for residents there. If
these are grown men, and you are bringing in 200
strange grown men to this area, will there be
background checks on them to be in this school?

And then I heard about the 172 or 75 cars a day from the traffic study that was done. And then we're saying that's not really going to increase because it's going to be four buses.

What about all the professors and visitors, how does that affect traffic?

And we see in other areas like Monsey, KJ, Palm Tree, the bus drivers get into accidents pretty frequently. That's not anything having to do with

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their race. I'm just more concerned with qualifications. Are these bus drivers going to be CDL? Are they just going to be members of the college that the college hired? Who is going to oversee that?

Then you have -- it's naive to assume that 200 men are going to stay in these tiny rooms that sound like a prison cell, three of them to a room, and not walk around the community or through the forest or across the street in people's backyards.

And then you have the buses coming in and the extra traffic. What if a pedestrian gets run over? What if it's a student? So now what -- who's that lawsuit go to? Does it go to the school? Does it go to Tuxedo? Does it come to Warwick? Because nobody's just going to get run over by a car and not sue. That's not the climate we live in.

So I'm just concerned about a lot of things and I don't think they're really being addressed.

We're mainly just addressing environmental.

But if this project goes through and they do everything up to code, there's a lot of other issues that really need to be looked into because it's easier to stop something than it is to go back once you have it in place because who's going to enforce just 200 students and 20 to 50 educators and visitors? Who's

to say it won't be 150?

And the occupancy says 200. Does that 200 include the professionals working there and visitors or is it students plus? Like what's the actual occupancy?

THE CHAIRMAN: You did make three minutes. Not bad.

MS. STEPH KOWALSKY: Yeah. Thank you.

THE CHAIRMAN: Anne Wibiralske. Anne?

MS. ANNE WIBIRALSKE: Good evening. I come before you respectfully. I'm Anne Wibiralske. I'm born and raised in Monroe. I grew up in my family home just a few miles from the north end of Sterling Forest.

I attended the very first meetings in the mid '80s, when Sterling Forest Corporation was being first -- when the forest protection efforts were first being put in place.

And there's been a tremendous effort at both from the federal to state, regional, and very local efforts to support the forest lands.

I stand before you today part just to underscore what you've been hearing. I don't need to repeat all the arguments that have been made around water quality, water quantity, biodiversity, rare and

1	endangered species, unique and fragile habitats, and
2	the issues around transportation and a higher density
3	residential setting.
4	I'd just like to let you just again
5	underscore that there's been very important issues
6	raised. And I believe that those issues being raised
7	put forth a strong argument for a Positive Declaration
8	for a Full Environmental Impact Statement.
9	And I encourage you to take to heart and
10	carefully look at what's been said.
11	THE CHAIRMAN: Thank you so much. And we
12	will.
13	MS. ANNE WIBIRALSKE: Thank you.
14	THE CHAIRMAN: That is the end of the list.
15	Lee, look at you.
16	MR. ROGER FRIEDMAN: I'm going to take Lee's
17	place.
18	THE CHAIRMAN: Lee's not going to like that.
19	MR. ROGER FRIEDMAN: That's okay. We're
20	friends.
21	I just want to say as Co-chairman of the
22	Sterling Forest Partnership, that the Sterling Forest
23	Partnership rejects any idea of the nature of the
24	population that's going to be in this school.

25

Our sole concern is environmental and has --

1	and we reject any discussion of the "who" who will
2	THE CHAIRMAN: Roger, thank you for that.
3	MR. ROGER FRIEDMAN: Okay.
4	THE CHAIRMAN: Because discrimination does
5	not come into any one of these professionals or board
6	members
7	MR. ROGER FRIEDMAN: I hope not.
8	THE CHAIRMAN: Quite frankly, it's
9	disgusting, and we will I appreciate you saying
10	that.
11	MR. ROGER FRIEDMAN: I told my people in our
12	very first meeting, if you don't feel exactly the same
13	way if this were a boarding if this were a prep
14	school for boys in blue blazers and neckties, go away.
15	I don't want you here.
16	THE CHAIRMAN: Thank you.
17	Lee.
18	MR. LEE SCHULZ: My name is Lee Schulz and
19	I'm talking on behalf of Edie Greenstein from 3 Oregor
20	Court, Tuxedo Park.
21	Edie says: I would not send my child to
22	this proposed school in the heart of Sterling Forest
23	State Park. As a responsible parent, I would never
24	risk the safety of my child.

The site of the proposed college was once

laboratories conducting experiments on animals, including apes. The laboratories are still riddled with asbestos according to the employees that I have spoken to.

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Just as a footnote to one of Mike's comments, right before the sale I was trying to broker a deal between NYU and Palisades Interstate Park. I was dealing with the VP of real estate at NYU. She told me in full disclosure that the building was riddled with asbestos and required to be demolished.

So, Mike, I think you have to look at your study again and see that it's really pervasive throughout the building.

Edie continues: This also applies to mold, chemical and lead contamination that the environment experts have reported are wide-spread throughout the building.

Jeopardizing the health of any student is terrifying. Sterling Forest State Park closes at dusk. They'll be no Park personnel to warn the 200 lives housed in isolation of any potential dangers, such as tornado or fire, both of which we've experienced in the park last fall.

Adults can escape the area by car. 200 -- excuse me -- students will be trapped. By the time

enough buses come to evacuate the large population of the school many lives could be lost.

Outdoor activities are fraught with danger. Exposure to ticks in the forest environment is a huge concern. There are many tick diseases, Lyme being the most familiar among us. Lyme disease can result in life-long health effects, including headaches, fatigue and joint pain.

As well as there are many animals that are home to Sterling Forest, including raccoons, bears and coyotes, just hungry for the snack of a college resident that may be carrying a package.

THE CHAIRMAN: You knew that would got a laugh. But that's all right. Go ahead.

MR. LEE SCHULZ: The thought of a wild animal attacking anyone cringes me with fear.

The alternative of imprisoning 200 young adults is cruel. There are no sidewalks on Old Forge Road -- Old Forge Road, a very hilly and narrow street. A college student out to enjoy our spectacular park will likely be out of sight of any incoming vehicles. The danger would be exasperated at night when darkness would obscure anyone on the roadway. This is obviously a disaster waiting to happen.

1	In addition, the steep drop-offs in the back
2	of the property are a concern. Engineers hired by the
3	college have reported that there is a ridge north of
4	Old Forge Road, toward the southern portion of the
5	site, with an elevation difference of 58 feet across
6	the site. This is not a safe location for 200 college
7	residents.
8	The 200 students, a minimum of 400-percent
9	increase in the park, would put a strain on police,
10	fire and ambulance.
11	BOARD MEMBER MCCONNELL: Time.
12	THE CHAIRMAN: Thank you.
13	MR. LEE SCHULZ: Okay.
14	THE CHAIRMAN: Anyone else who would like
15	one second. Anyone else who has not spoken?
16	UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: May I?
17	THE CHAIRMAN: Not yet. I got the guy in
18	the back. We called you first. I'm going to get to
19	you.
20	UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: And here, too.
21	THE CHAIRMAN: I'll get him next.
22	UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Thank you.
23	MR. JAMES MEHLING: Good evening. Cheese
24	and crackers. Been a hell of a night.

THE CHAIRMAN: Would you state your name for

the record, sir.

MR. JAMES MEHLING: Sure. Jim Mehling; M-E-H-L-I-N-G. Cascade Road, Warwick.

Born in Tuxedo Hospital, 1963. I grew up in Laurel Ridge. Lived there for 16 years. Lived in Orange County my whole life.

Sat on the other side. Don't envy you right now. Don't envy you.

This has been one of the best turnouts I can recall ever seen at a board meeting anywhere. A lot of people here tonight supporting you. Supporting you on doing your due diligence to protect them and what we have out there in this world.

This isn't about who. And I'm tired of the talk about the who. I've lived in this area my whole life. I could rail on and on. It's not relevant.

This is about the what. And the what has been well allocuted by these folks here tonight as to the impact it has on the area, our town.

I'm all for improvement. I'm all for -shit, this Town, this whole area was suburban -- rural
my whole life. Now it's suburb. And you know, you're
a farmer. It's changed. Progress comes. A lot of
people don't like it. I'm not a big fan myself. But
at the same time, I'm here so who am I to say someone

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else can't come in?

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The historical significance cannot be

But they got to be good neighbors. have to be good neighbors. We all have to be good neighbors.

You have a responsibility. You don't leave garbage and crap out in your yard. You don't leave stuff laying out in the road for other people to have to drive by and go when's he going to pick up his garbage? How come it says construction and demolition debris laying out in the road? Some people do do that.

We have a responsibility to maintain the integrity of this Town for all of us, not just us. For our kids.

I grew up down there. My dad was a founding member of the Sterling Forest Volunteer Fire Company and its first president. I was a junior member. ran Warwick EMS for 18 years as an EMT. Trust me, I know first responders and emergency services inside and out.

That being said, yeah, it is a big deal down It's remote and isolated as hell. We used to camp, fish, hike, swim in Sterling Lake when I was a kid. Amazing area.

	- OLD FORGE ROAD, LLC -
1	understated, as Dr. Hull stated. If it wasn't for
2	that area, we wouldn't have put the chain across the
3	Hudson and kept the British from going down to New
4	York and splitting the Colonies in half.
5	It's more than just a school. This is about
6	our Town. This is about the future of this Town and
7	all of the people that live here.
8	I don't envy you in what you do, but I do

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ask you and charge you with do your due diligence, please.

These people will back you to the hilt. We will fill this hall and fill the parking lot to support you in doing your job. Do it.

THE CHAIRMAN: Jim, I will say this, as you well know --

MR. JAMES MEHLING: Yup.

THE CHAIRMAN: This Board always --

MR. JAMES MEHLING: I know.

THE CHAIRMAN: Always -- I want to state that one more time -- always does their due diligence on any application.

MR. JAMES MEHLING: I know. I know.

THE CHAIRMAN: Thank you.

MR. JAMES MEHLING: That's why I want to implore you to continue doing that. Thank you.

1	THE CHAIRMAN: Yes, sir. Thank you.
2	MR. CHRISTOPHER KEELTY: Hi. Thank you.
3	Hi, I'm Chris Keelty. I live here in Warwick.
4	I wanted to thank
5	THE CHAIRMAN: Can you spell your name.
6	MR. CHRISTOPHER KEELTY: Oh, you mean you're
7	not going to guess? Last name's K-E-E-L-T-Y.
8	I wanted to thank my neighbor here for
9	saying what needed to be said
10	THE CHAIRMAN: Absolutely.
11	MR. CHRISTOPHER KEELTY: This is not about
12	who these people are. This is still the United
13	States. We still have religious freedom. We did when
14	I walked in here.
15	THE CHAIRMAN: We still do.
16	MR. CHRISTOPHER KEELTY: I haven't
17	checked the headlines.
18	THE CHAIRMAN: We still do.
19	MR. CHRISTOPHER KEELTY: We'll see when I
20	leave.
21	But, you know, this is not about who people

25	I will say personally that I think the

direction that this property -- that the park in general has been moving has been very positive. I think that this seems like a step in the wrong direction, to take -- to establish a residential property.

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MR. KRAHULIK: Mmm-hmm.

MR. CHRISTOPHER KEELTY: -- said earlier this is -- that this property is not part of the bird conservation area. That is true. But it's sort of true the way the Vatican is not part of Rome.

THE CHAIRMAN: We can only deal with the facts, okay.

MR. CHRISTOPHER KEELTY: No, and legally -
THE CHAIRMAN: Just said and legally and

from our attorney --

MR. CHRISTOPHER KEELTY: Legally I know that makes a difference. And your attorney is absolutely right to cite it. It doesn't make a difference to migratory birds. They don't understand that little carve-out.

So what I would suggest and what I would appreciate is just given the location, given that this is in a piece of preserved land that has been moving in this direction, for this Board to err on the side

1	of looking as close and scrutinizing the environmental
2	impact as closely as possible so that we can really be
3	clear about what that impact might be.
4	THE CHAIRMAN: Certainly. That's what we
5	intend to do. Thank you.
6	MR. CHRISTOPHER KEELTY: And that's it.
7	THE CHAIRMAN: Anyone else?
8	How about you, sir.
9	MR. DON KILCOYNE: Hi. Um, the last couple
10	of folks hi, my name is Don Kilcoyne.

The problem is that hearing what you've already done due-diligence-wise, I think you are going to come out with the same response, and I mean that in a positive way. You are going to have the same result, but the public would like you to crack it open again, take another look.

THE CHAIRMAN: We, to crack it open, we never closed it.

MR. DON KILCOYNE: Okay.

THE CHAIRMAN: So to say something's final, that's not the case. It's always -- it's always a process. The process is we're still doing our due diligence.

As I said three hours ago now -- I mean, maybe a little better, no action is going to be taken tonight. No vote.

MR. DON KILCOYNE: I gotcha.

THE CHAIRMAN: It's this Board's decision to -- to follow the code, to follow our professionals. Everything that's provided is reviewed. They bring it

We also have a record of drownings. We had 17 one last year. And right there on Sterling Lake 18 there's no supervision after five o'clock. 200 young 19 We all know that's a recipe for disaster. 20 They're going to be up on the north shore of Sterling 21 22 Forest.

3	been like, you know, anything besides like an
4	environmental kind of study done. What I'm thinking
, <u>,</u>	of ig the agenemias of overwthing

Five, ten, 15, 20 years from now, because
myself, like a lot of people in here, are raising a
family in Warwick. And, you know, what I'm thinking
about is is this a positive impact economically on our
town or is it something that could potentially be a
negative impact down the road in the future? Maybe
not immediately but I'm looking, you know, ten, 20, 30
years down the road.

And I haven't heard anybody bring up the economics of a school coming into our Town.

So I don't know if you guys have any comments on that tonight or if there's somewhere I can look into that. But that's just what I'm thinking of. And I know it's probably on some people's mind.

You know, the environmental issues are a big deal, but, you know, there's going to be some type of economic impact to this because there has to be, right? And so thank you.

THE CHAIRMAN: Thank you, sir.

MR. WILL ROERDEN: Appreciate it.

THE CHAIRMAN: Anyone else? Anyone else?

MS. ANKA SIMON: Good evening. This is my first board meeting I've attended. I'm enjoying the process and the civility of everything.

THE CHAIRMAN: Can we get your name for the

record.

1.4

MS. ANKA SIMON: Yes. My name is Anka Simon, spelled A-N-K-A. Last name S-I-M-O-N. I'm here in the Village of Warwick.

An avid enthusiast of Sterling Forest.

I don't want to go down -- a lot has been addressed. I support pretty much everything that has been stated.

I want to share a personal experience and why I'm a bit shaken and hope that the decision will go for the voices that you've heard today.

I have appealed to you to please take character of the Applicant into your decisions. It's not about a religious background. It's about past behavior of the character of this community.

And I want to just use a minute to share an experience that I had on an eight-hour flight with 40 members of this community about three months ago.

And it was the absolute -- I'm sorry, I'm still so upset -- absolute disregard of rule and order on a plane at 30,000 feet.

Stewardesses could not control them. The pilot could not control them. They were standing in the aisles. They were standing at the rest rooms. They were leaning on other flight member's seats.

1	Despite the stewardesses asking them to take their
2	seat, they moved one row back.
3	So here I was for an hour with a member of
4	this community leaning on my chair refusing to go.
5	So it's not about the community except it's
6	about the behavior of this character. Use this as
7	guidance from past. Past is an indication of the
8	future.
9	You have to follow code. You have to follow
10	your ordinance. But you do with what you know. Set
11	guardrails as much as you can.
12	THE CHAIRMAN: We have to follow the law.
13	MS. ANKA SIMON: You have to follow the law
14	but what you know about past behavior
15	THE CHAIRMAN: Well
16	MS. ANKA SIMON: Set the guardrails
17	THE CHAIRMAN: That's tough
18	MS. ANKA SIMON: I know it's really tough.
19	THE CHAIRMAN: For this Board to even
20	entertain that
21	MS. ANKA SIMON: I understand.
22	THE CHAIRMAN: I hate to say that because I
23	could (inaudible).
24	BOARD MEMBER MCCONNELL: Mr. Chairman
25	(inaudible).

1	THE CHAIRMAN: No I understand. I mean I
2	understand your experience
3	MS. ANKA SIMON: I understand and I wanted
4	to just share that. And, you know, again, everything
5	that's been said.
6	So I'm going to take it away from there. I
7	know you don't have an easy job with this.
8	THE CHAIRMAN: Thank you.
9	Anyone else?
10	MS. KIKI NELSON: Okay. Thank you. At the
11	risk of making another fool of myself, I want to see
12	how quickly I can do this.
13	THE CHAIRMAN: You didn't make a fool of
14	yourself.
15	MS. KIKI NELSON: Hopefully I can do this.
16	I just wanted to point out a couple of
17	really bad interpretations
18	UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Quiet, please.
19	MS. KIKI NELSON: Hi. Interpretations in
20	the EAF Part 3, section three, which is entitled the
21	impact on human health. There's a point there
22	UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Quiet, please.
23	MS. KIKI NELSON: There's a point there in
24	August 9th, 2017, where there's reference to an
25	asbestos abatement monitoring enclosure report.

1	That was done by NYU in preparation of
2	closing the building and attempting to sell it.
3	In that same report they kind of dovetail
4	into the idea that that there was an actual
5	abatement, but the abatement was only done on the
6	second-floor laboratories in a very small space.
7	The implication in this document makes it
8	seem like the entire building was abated.
9	THE CHAIRMAN: Absolutely not.
10	MS. KIKI NELSON: It was absolutely not
11	and
12	THE CHAIRMAN: At this point if I can stop
13	you there.
14	MS. KIKI NELSON: Yes.
15	THE CHAIRMAN: This Planning Board has been
16	in that building.
17	MS. KIKI NELSON: Okay. I know. And I call
18	you intrepid for doing it and I hope you had the right
19	masks on because there's all sorts of stuff
20	THE CHAIRMAN: We were in there. All I'm
21	saying is we were in there. We signed a waiver to go
22	in there.
23	MS. KIKI NELSON: I understand. That should
24	have been a huge red flag.
25	THE CHAIRMAN: No, no, no.

1 MS. KIKI NELSON: Why are they asking that? 2 THE CHAIRMAN: Because who knows? The -- we did our due diligence to go in there to see what we 3 had to see. Period. That's what we did. 4 MS. KIKI NELSON: All right. So here's what 5 6 I want to say in addition to that. 7 Lab cleanup is a very specialized category. You don't get, you know, the lab cleanup team and it's 8 a whole process. NYU did a very good job. 9 10 But the LLC that bought this place has left 11 the place in rack and ruin. They had broken windows for literally for years. And they also allowed a 12 13 flood to go on unabated for maybe months. 14 So the result is whatever the monitoring of the air was at the time that NYU did their monitoring, 15 16 that's no longer valid. 17 THE CHAIRMAN: As Mr. Musso pointed out. 18 MS. KIKI NELSON: Yes. And --19 THE CHAIRMAN: He pointed that out that we know if -- it has to be abated. It has to be done 20 21 with New York State building code. 22 MS. KIKI NELSON: That's right. 23 THE CHAIRMAN: It has to be done with monitors from the Town of Warwick to be on site. 24

That there is no way that building as of

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know that.

1	right now everybody here
2	MS. KIKI NELSON: It's totally
3	uninhabitable.
4	THE CHAIRMAN: Absolutely.
5	MS. KIKI NELSON: Yes.
6	THE CHAIRMAN: Nobody wants to walk in that
7	building.
8	MS. KIKI NELSON: No. And I mean you can
9	smell the mold from outside.
10	THE CHAIRMAN: You wait until you go inside.
11	MS. KIKI NELSON: So the other thing I was
12	going to point out, which I actually can't believe
13	like I'm pretty sure I must be wrong about this, all
14	the testing that they did took place in the animal
15	facility so all these organic chemicals, all these
16	radioactive materials
17	BOARD MEMBER MCCONNELL: Time.
18	MS. KIKI NELSON: were all done there.
19	THE CHAIRMAN: Thank you.
20	MS. KIKI NELSON: That looks that's where
21	the dormitories are going to be.
22	THE CHAIRMAN: That's why we have to make
23	sure
24	MS. KIKI NELSON: I mean, I can't that's
25	beyond

1 THE CHAIRMAN: No, I understand. 2. You, ma'am, in the back, you wanted to 3 speak? 4 State your name for the record, please. 5 MS. LISA MILANO: Lisa Milano; Greenwood Lake. 6 7 I agree with everything everyone here has 8 been saying overall. But I wanted to speak to the woman who was 9 10 just before me regarding the character of the group that is seeking this approval. 11 12 And I want to say just where have they been? 13 I'm a volunteer with the trail conference. I'm in 14 that park all the time. I don't see anybody from this 15 group there helping, maintaining the trails. I clean 16 up litter along 17. And I'm the only person doing 17 that, like bags and bags. 18 So I just wonder like what is the character 19 of this group? They don't --20 THE CHAIRMAN: They are not -- Lisa, I 21 cannot comment on someone's character. 22 MS. LISA MILANO: And I'm talking about as far as their sense of the ecology that's already been 23 2.4 taking place there.

No one is -- clearly, we're all voicing

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about the environmental impact. But nobody from this group is saying hey, we're going to have like mandatory volunteer hours to try to, you know, maintain the --

THE CHAIRMAN: I think you know that's tough to deal with. You know because you're the one cleaning it up by yourself.

MS. LISA MILANO: But -- and also what is the mechanism here for when they're not abiding all of these like regulations and --

THE CHAIRMAN: If they violate the site plan -- as every other application, if you do a site plan, a special use, and you violate your site plan, you just did that, you violate your site plan.

MS. LISA MILANO: And what happens?

THE CHAIRMAN: You get cited violations.

You go to court. You get your site plan null and
void; correct, Bob?

MR. KRAHULIK: Right. There's also many Town ordinances against littering, garbage, things like that.

MS. LISA MILANO: Okay. And the lighting and --

THE CHAIRMAN: You have lighting has to comply with the Town code. Everything -- the same as

like Price Chopper would have to has to comply.
MS. LISA MILANO: Is there a time frame for
when all of the construction is going to be happening?
THE CHAIRMAN: It will be. I mean, if it's
approved.
THE DEFENDANT: Yeah. Is there like a limit
or like
THE CHAIRMAN: There's hours of operation in
the code that they have to adhere to.
MS. LISA MILANO: Okay. Thank you.
THE CHAIRMAN: Thank you. Anyone else?
Yes. It's been awhile, huh?
MS. SUSAN SCHER: Yeah. But I've changed
what I'm going to say. Although I'll cite
THE CHAIRMAN: State your name for the
record, please.
MS. SUSAN SCHER: Susan Scher and I'm
THE CHAIRMAN: Excuse me. We're not done
yet.
MS. SUSAN SCHER: My name is Susan Scher.
And along with Roger Friedman, I am co-chair

2	I learned tonight that you have and that
3	seemed odd to me, since that's the job of the
4	Applicant. I've learned tonight subsequently that the

8	THE CHAIRMAN: It is on line.
9	THE SECRETARY: It's on line.
10	MS. SUSAN SCHER: What?
11	THE CHAIRMAN: It's posted on line.
12	MS. SUSAN SCHER: Okay. It's posted on
13	line. It's not been anything that was sent to us as
14	we Foiled information.
15	THE CHAIRMAN: Because we just got it a few
16	days ago. You have to request a FOIL.
17	MS. SUSAN SCHER: Okay. So we will go on
18	line
19	THE CHAIRMAN: It will be available. It
20	will available for
21	THE SECRETARY: It's on the Town's it's
22	on the website.
23	MS. SUSAN SCHER: We will do that. But I
24	want to say something else.

For the past two years, the Board and the

1 consultants have seen several of the members of Sterling Forest Partnership here at all of your 3 meetings. 4 THE CHAIRMAN: Absolutely. 5 MS. SUSAN SCHER: And we have heard and we've been interested in the what of the project. 6 7 We're interested in the environmental aspect. And we are mostly concerned and feel partly what's been left 8 out is discussion of the impact on the park itself. 9 10 We've dealt a lot with the impact on the 11 site and we're concerned about the park itself. 12 And I think what you've heard tonight -- I counted 160 people and I don't know how many people 13 14 were out there. I've counted 289 letters that have 15 come to the Board. 16 THE SECRETARY: 292 so far. 17 MS. SUSAN SCHER: Oh, okay. Whoops. 18 THE CHAIRMAN: Listen, you are not going to 19 beat Connie on this. Not going to happen. 20 MS. SUSAN SCHER: It's not on here --21 THE CHAIRMAN: It's not going to happen. 22 MS. SUSAN SCHER: That's right. Things 23 change from one hour to the next.

MS. SUSAN SCHER: So too our -- the

THE CHAIRMAN: Connie is very diligent.

1	petition, which
2	THE CHAIRMAN: We have it.
3	MS. SUSAN SCHER: just grows by hour.
4	So you've gotten probably now about 2,000 or
5	them. I don't know in the past hour and a half how
6	many.
7	So that's another group of people that
8	you've heard from besides the Partnership people, the
9	people here tonight, the 2,000 people on the petition,
10	the 25 people who live in the residences in the park,
11	the other 150 petitions that have come from hikers.
12	THE CHAIRMAN: We understand.
13	MS. SUSAN SCHER: So I'm reminding you that
14	there are a lot of people who are concerned about the
15	impact on the Park and feel
16	BOARD MEMBER MCCONNELL: Time.
17	MS. SUSAN SCHER: Okay.
18	THE CHAIRMAN: Thank you, Susan.
19	MS. SUSAN SCHER: Okay. But we want to
20	thank you for all of your hard work and your paying
21	attention.
22	THE CHAIRMAN: You bet.
23	MS. SUSAN SCHER: To the what.
24	THE CHAIRMAN: Thank you.
25	State your name for the record, please.

1 MS. DANIELLE SADOWSKI: Danielle Sadowski. 2 I have a concern. So I moved to Warwick for a reason. I left Monroe for a reason. I have a 3 4 four-year old. I love the school district here. 5 love Warwick. It makes me very emotional about what's going on. 6 7 But I have a question. If they don't get approved for a school, and they already own it, what 8 9 is it going to be for them? 10 THE CHAIRMAN: They have to -- they can't do anything without coming to this Board. 11 12 So if they own it, this is what they -- this 13 is what they obviously want to do. 14 We are in the process, as you've heard 15 tonight, and it's been over a year, am I correct? 16 Over a year? Over a year of the process. 17 As was said this evening, you know, we -- my 18 tenure on this Board, 23, 24 years. Yeah. Too long. 19 But with that being said, we've seen numerous projects 20 from I think -- Jim, he may have left already. But 21 there was a (inaudible). I grew up in Warwick. I 22 want to tell you --23 MS. DANIELLE SADOWSKI: I'm from Rockland

THE CHAIRMAN: So anyhow, the bottom line

County. So I left there --

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is --

MS. DANIELLE SADOWSKI: Left Monroe. Freason --

MS. DANIELLE SADOWSKI: I know, but we --

THE CHAIRMAN: Things change. Things change. There's a lot of people --

THE CHAIRMAN: A lot of -- hold on. A lot of people that are here are in subdivisions that were farm fields when I was a kid. So but it has to be done correctly.

But I think one of the issues that was brought up tonight to this Board, which I can't stress it enough, look at the history of this Town of Warwick. This is not just blowing smoke, not talking to the members, to the professionals. I say it on the record. I say it. I mean it. That this Board takes every project — not just this project, because it's not just this project. We have numerous projects we have to deal with. But we take them very seriously. We follow the code. And we follow everything that has to be done properly. That's what we do.

So everybody's voice, concern, as I said, I've said it numerous times today --

BOARD MEMBER MCCONNELL: And don't forget, we live in this Town also.

1	MS. DANIELLE SADOWSKI: Yeah, but
2	THE CHAIRMAN: And like I said numerous
3	times, getting it on the record is very imperative to
4	me. This is not going to be and I applaud everyone
5	here for not applauding because it makes the
6	difference when our secretary does the minutes that
7	everything is done factually and that's what we do.
8	So thank you for your comments. Thank you
9	for your concern.
10	Anyone else wishing to tell us their point
11	of view? Yes.
12	MS. ELISSA VELEZ: Hi. My name is Elissa
13	Velez, V as in Victor, E-L-E-Z. I wasn't going to
14	speak
15	THE CHAIRMAN: Speak into the microphone.
16	THE SECRETARY: I'm sorry. What was your
17	first name?
18	MS. ELISSA VELEZ: Elissa, E-L-I-S-S-A.
19	Velez.
20	I wasn't going to speak tonight so I'm going
21	to be very ill-prepared here. But one thing that has
22	been coming up in little bits and pieces that I don't
23	think has been a big focus is how this is going to
24	impact the residents who live next to them.

Case in point, our Airbnb. We have this

beautiful Airbnb code. Guess what? It doesn't get enforced unless if the residents discover a violation. And not only report it, but you have to have evidence which requires pictures or this or that or the other thing.

It took over a year for the Town to enforce their own code on a violation for a dumpster that was out in pure sight for over a year.

So I think that there's the points that have been brought up are very important but I think there's also community effects that you guys really need to factor into this decision.

THE CHAIRMAN: Thank you.

MS. ELISSA VELEZ: If you are going to have a code it needs to be clear. It needs to have like clear repercussions and there has to be follow-through immediately.

Thank you.

THE CHAIRMAN: Thank you.

Anyone else?

Yes, ma'am.

MS. SUSAN WILBUR: Hi. Thank you so much. I wasn't planning on speaking tonight. And thank you guys for letting everyone come up and have a voice. Thank you.

1 THE CHAIRMAN: Your name. 2 MS. SUSAN WILBUR: My name is Susan Wilbur and I live in Forest Park in Greenwood Lake. 3 4 THE SECRETARY: Susan, what was your last 5 name? 6 MS. SUSAN WILBUR: Wilbur. 7 THE SECRETARY: Thank you. 8 MS. SUSAN WILBUR: You're welcome. 9 So I don't know what goes in. It seems like a lot of hard work and decision-making that's going 10 11 into this, but I just, when you have a proposal like this, do you guys look at what's going to benefit the 12 13 registered taxpayers in the area or is this going to 14 be more harmful? 15 THE CHAIRMAN: We have a code --16 MS. SUSAN WILBUR: Okay. 17 THE CHAIRMAN: -- that the taxpayers are all 18 We can't arbitrarily say you can't do this part of. 19 because --20 MS. SUSAN WILBUR: Right. THE CHAIRMAN: -- if it's a subdivision, say you're Astorino Farm. I'll use my farm for example. If I want to subdivide it --MS. SUSAN WILBUR: Okay. THE CHAIRMAN: And you live next to it --

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1	MS. SUSAN WILBUR: Mmm-hmm.
2	THE CHAIRMAN: You may not like that.
3	MS. SUSAN WILBUR: Right.
4	THE CHAIRMAN: Correct?
5	MS. SUSAN WILBUR: Right.
6	THE CHAIRMAN: But you can't say to me or to
7	the owner of that farm that you can't subdivide that.
8	If I follow all the rules, do everything
9	correctly, who are you you know what I mean? Whose
10	the municipality? If it's in their zoning code that
11	says you can do this. But there is a process, as you
12	all see this evening. There is a process.
13	And I'll take my farm off the record,
14	because I (inaudible) just so we all know that.
15	MS. SUSAN WILBUR: Okay.
16	THE CHAIRMAN: But with that being said,
17	since I've been on this Board, all the farms I grew up
18	with, a lot of them are subdivisions now.
19	MS. SUSAN WILBUR: Okay.
20	THE CHAIRMAN: Do I think they're done
21	correctly? Yeah, drive through them. They're very
22	beautiful homes. Very beautiful lots. Taken care
23	of but the process is this and this is what we do.
24	MC SUSAN WITBUR: Okay. So it would be
25	I don't know, to halt it or to come to

1 a --2 THE CHAIRMAN: To arbitrarily say no? 3 this Board will not arbitrarily say no. 4 MS. SUSAN WILBUR: Right. 5 THE CHAIRMAN: But we have to -- we're going through a process. As I said earlier, we're not 6 7 making a decision tonight on it. 8 MS. SUSAN WILBUR: Okay. 9 THE CHAIRMAN: We're going to take everybody's information, disseminate it and see what's 10 valid. And if it's not valid, what we can do, what we 11 12 can enforce. 13 To say I don't like it because of this, 14 okay, that's fine. 15 MS. SUSAN WILBUR: Right. 16 THE CHAIRMAN: But that really doesn't hold 17 water in a court of law. MS. SUSAN WILBUR: Okay. So if something 18 was proven harmful, like with all the literature, you 19 20 know, that you were given tonight --21 THE CHAIRMAN: Not literature. The facts. 22 MS. SUSAN WILBUR: Okay. 23 THE CHAIRMAN: It can't be -- you can't hand

me a piece of paper. I'm going to take that -- Max is

our SEQR expert. If something -- if he tells me,

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1	okay, Ben, yeah, but we vetted this. We'll vet it.
2	But if it doesn't if there's something that has to
3	be changed, it goes back to the Applicant. If they
4	can't change it, then that's on them. Then we won't
5	proceed. But if there's something that vets it and
6	it's done properly, we move forward.
7	I mean there's a lot of stuff that goes into
8	this as you heard this evening, not just a five-minute
. 9	deal.
10	MS. SUSAN WILBUR: Right. So with all the
11	evidence, I guess you go over it with all the evidence
12	that you're presented tonight and then you come to a
13	decision.
14	THE CHAIRMAN: We'll see. I'm not even
15	going to allude to what that decision is going to be.
16	MS. SUSAN WILBUR: Oh, no, no. Of
17	course not.
18	THE CHAIRMAN: Because we don't know.
19	MS. SUSAN WILBUR: No. But how long will it
20	take you to come to a decision?
21	THE CHAIRMAN: We don't know.
22	MS. SUSAN WILBUR: And then how will the

THE CHAIRMAN: We're the voters.

MS. SUSAN WILBUR: What's that? You.

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voters be notified?

Τ	THE CHAIRMAN: We vote. We vote on it.
2	MS. SUSAN WILBUR: I know. But the voters
3	of, you know, Greenwood Lake, Tuxedo. Like Warwick.
4	Like when will we
5	THE CHAIRMAN: It's on our website. Every
6	action we do is on the website.
7	MS. SUSAN WILBUR: Okay. So to look at the
8	website.
9	THE CHAIRMAN: Roger. Go talk to Roger.
10	He'll know.
11	MS. SUSAN WILBUR: Okay.
12	THE CHAIRMAN: And your time is up, but
13	thank you.
14	MS. SUSAN WILBUR: Thank you.
15	THE CHAIRMAN: Anyone else?
16	MR. MICHAEL HUDSON: Yes. My name is
17	Michael Hudson. I live in Greenwood Lake.
18	Okay. I've been hearing all the
19	technicalities and things tonight, but what I'd like
20	to know is with a petition of 2,000-plus people, how
21	much weight does that hold in all this decision-making
22	whether we go through with this?
23	THE CHAIRMAN: Not much.
24	MR. MICHAEL HUDSON: Not much, okay.
25	THE CHAIRMAN: Because we have to follow the

We have to follow the SEQR laws. We go from 1 codes. 2 there. 3 I could have 30,000 people come here and say we don't want it. We have to make sure it's done 4 5 properly. 6 And just to say Michael Hudson doesn't want 7 it, okay. 8 MR. MICHAEL HUDSON: Okay. THE CHAIRMAN: That's -- it's just not --9 10 it's not in the code where if you -- if we get 30 --11 BOARD MEMBER MCCONNELL: The better question may be if we ever approved a project that there were 12 lots of people who were unhappy with it, absolutely; 13 14 but, they followed the code. 15 The Applicant followed the code and the objections that people had didn't rise to the level to 16 17 call into question the adherence to the code. 18 MR. MICHAEL HUDSON: Okay. 19 BOARD MEMBER MCCONNELL: That's what we're 20 guided by. 21 MR. MICHAEL HUDSON: Well, I think that we need to know that, if we're basically we're wasting

that people don't know that.

4	THE CHAIRMAN: Don't say that.
2	MR. MICHAEL HUDSON: Well, we're voicing
3	THE CHAIRMAN: You are here this evening.
4	It's not a waste of time.
5	MR. MICHAEL HUDSON: Absolutely. But what
6	I'm saying is people should know that this petition
7	doesn't hold much weight in the decision that's going
8	to be made. Okay.
9	THE CHAIRMAN: Thank you.
10	Anyone else? Let the record oh.
11	MS. LAUREN VITKOVSKY: Just a question.
12	THE CHAIRMAN: You just made it. Come up
13	here.
14	MS. LAUREN VITKOVSKY: Sorry.
15	THE CHAIRMAN: That was good.
16	MS. LAUREN VITKOVSKY: No. I just have a
17	quick question about the traffic study.
18	THE CHAIRMAN: Just state your name for the
19	record.
20	THE DEFENDANT: My name is Lauren Vitkovsky;
21	V-I-T-K-O-V-S-K-Y.
22	I just wanted to know the dates of the
23	traffic study. Because I know the Town has a history
24	of doing traffic studies in off hours.
25	THE CHAIRMAN: Town doesn't have a history

of doing traffic studies at all. But we do have a 1 2 history of reviewing traffic studies from an 3 Applicant. 4 We don't do the traffic studies. the traffic studies to our specifications and it's 5 6 reviewed by our professionals. 7 MS. BARCA: Right. How the traffic studies and how most studies work is the Applicant provides 8 the Board with a scope of what they're going to do and 9 then if it falls into like an engineering realm --10 11 MS. LAUREN VITKOVSKY: Okay. So maybe I misspoke. They accept traffic studies given on --12 13 THE CHAIRMAN: We review --14 MS. LAUREN VITKOVSKY: Right. 15 THE CHAIRMAN: -- traffic studies. 16 MS. LAUREN VITKOVSKY: So --17 THE CHAIRMAN: Our professionals that work for the Town, the Planning Board, review the traffic 18 19 Any questions, comments, concerns from Board members gets vetted. And if we get questioned tonight that relates to that, we make sure it's done properly. MS. LAUREN VITKOVSKY: Right.

19	MS. LAUREN VITKOVSKY: I know. I'm really
20	good like that.
21	MS. BARCA: The traffic study was done
22	Wednesday, June 21st, 2023, to Wednesday, June 28th,
23	2023.
24	And the a.m. peak hour was done 8:00 a.m. to
25	9:00 a.m. The p.m. peak hour was done from 3:00 p.m.

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1	to 4:00 p.m.
2	And the vehicles were monitored the
3	number of vehicles per day was also monitored.
4	MS. LAUREN VITKOVSKY: So was that during
5	the school year?
6	UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: No.
7	MS. LAUREN VITKOVSKY: So any students in
8	the area weren't accounted for, and any school buses
9	that travel in the area weren't necessarily accounted
10	for
11	THE CHAIRMAN: We'll check the dates.
12	MS. LAUREN VITKOVSKY: So
13	THE CHAIRMAN: We'll check the dates.
14	MS. BARCA: Yeah, we can check the dates on
15	that.
16	MS. LAUREN VITKOVSKY: Okay.
