The regular meeting of the Town Board of the Town of Warwick was held on Thursday, October 12, 2023 at the Town Hall, 132 Kings Highway, Town of Warwick. Supervisor Sweeton called the meeting to order at 7:30 p.m.

REVOCATION APPEAL HEARING FOR 105 DEKAY ROAD

Supervisor Sweeton – The hearing of revocation potential of an Airbnb permit, short-term rental permit and it's for the property 105 DeKay Road and I believe the owners are here tonight. You had 3 violations that were noticed. We had revised our code to make it easier for the town to act upon short-term rentals that were violating our ordinance. While we are not opposed to short-term rentals, we are opposed to permit holders who failed to obey the regulations. You need to recognize that you are in a neighborhood and that there are neighbors' concerns with a short-term rental. We are going to give you the opportunity because we have that under the code to talk about why the permit should not be revoked. It does remain in effect until such time as we make a decision and we won't make that decision tonight. We take your testimony and then we will confer about that at the next meeting on October 26th and have a decision for the first meeting in November which would be the 2nd. You can come forward and state your name for the record and address the 3 concerns. You were cited for advertisement and occupancy of 12 guests when only 8 maximum are permitted, excessive noise and amount of people 40 to 50 on the site on February 5th and I think there was an issue of a dumpster on the front lawn. If you want to come forward and speak to the issue you can just give us your name for the record.

Solomon Franczoz – I didn't know there was an issue with the dumpster in the front of the house. I would really like to address it and correct it. There was a charity event that the owner made at the house back in February. It was actually the rental which we are very sorry about, so we took steps so it shouldn't happen again, by installing a noise detector from a company called Noise Aware. This gives us a report when people come in and if there's a crowd or if there's excessive smoke going into the house or noise for more than the amount that should be there and we get alerts. We try and greet them at the door so we know how many occupants are coming and make sure it matches to what they wrote on how many occupancies are coming. We do background checks on everyone that books through Airbnb or VRBO. We try to be very consistent on that, so we keep everything. I put the dumpster

there because I didn't want a mess around the house with just one or two garbage cans. I thought it would be safer and cleaner with a dumpster that's covered and picked up twice a week. If that's an issue I really want to fix it. I'm truly sorry about the advertisement, I was on two different sites and in one room we have 4 beds so I automatically changed the number from 8 guests to 12 guests. We corrected it once we got the notice.

Supervisor Sweeton - So your current advertisement shows 8 maximum, correct?

Solomon Franczoz - Yes.

Supervisor Sweeton — Ok. The dumpster can't be on the front there. If it was secured somewhere else on the property and covered. It would have to be a stockade fence or something around it, it can't be out visible on the property. I don't know if people have any questions, again you're in a neighborhood and people are there. We set up a process and the police department will be implementing it that when a complaint comes into them, they'll have the address and the record either owner or agent and they will be called by the department and they will be instructed to be there within an hour. You need a registered agents that's in Orange County, I don't know who yours is I didn't look at your permit but they need to be able to respond within an hour. It's good that you have the devices there to alert you, but there has to be action taken when you get that notice.

Solomon Franczoz – I would really appreciate it if we could get a call if somethings going on so we can know. We do have cameras on all 4 sides of the property so we do monitor it a lot and try to be safe.

Supervisor Sweeton – Any questions gentlemen? So, the process is going to be in 2 weeks when we reconvene, we are going to have a public discussion and you don't have to be here physically but you can. We have YouTube so you can see it and a decision would be made on November 2^{nd} . The permit remains in effect until that time until the decision is rendered.

Solomon Franczoz - Thank you so much.

Supervisor Sweeton - Thank you for coming tonight.

DISCUSSION: REVOCATION OF 20 DEER POND DRIVE

Supervisor Sweeton – We had another discussion, two meetings ago had a presentation by another violation and that was 20 Deer Pond Drive and that was the attorney who came and the agent who came. They had discussed what they have done to ensure that they remain within the code in their operations. I don't know if you had any thoughts on that presentation or any concerns? I haven't had any other calls on them yet, so with your pleasure I can prepare resolutions for you for the next meeting because that's when you would decide anyway. If you want to think about it a little bit more you need to let me know between now and then as to what you want to do with them.

DISCUSSION: REVOCATION OF 20 MILLER'S LANE

Supervisor Sweeton - We were due to have a decision on that permit this evening and based on the testimony from the owners it seemed like they were making efforts, but I did get this week which I provided to all of you subsequent complaints about violations. I think those complaints need to be taken into consideration. This is a repeat violator and we took them at their word when they testified at the last meeting, but this is new information. We need to verify the information and the complaint and then I would say we would have that discussion at our next meeting as well.

Councilman Shuback - I agree.

PRESENTATION: PETITION FOR ZONING CHANGE

Eileen Astorino, Town Clerk – There was a petition for a zone change at Sanfordville Road for senior housing to change the district there.

Supervisor Sweeton - For the publics information we have in the Towns Zoning Code something called a Senior Housing Floating Zone. It's designed to be a zone that is brought down on a parcel of property that has different underlying zoning and it provides some provisions, some bonus benefits to whoever's going to produce the senior housing for doing so. We have had our very first petition to do that and it's a two-part petition, it's a text change and the reason it's a text change is that property on Sanfordville Road is in the Office Industrial Zone, which is a Commercial Zone that has no underlying residential Density. The Senior Housing Floating Zone criteria uses for the density of the zone the Underlying residential density. The text change is suggesting that you use the adjacent density of the residential district to the OI Zone. The Senior Housing Floating Zone is allowed to be drawn down in the OI Zone, it's a flaw in the analysis when we created the zone back in 2002, that we didn't take into account that there was no residential density in the OI Zone. In my opinion in reviewing the petition this is a perfect use for this piece of property. It's a 70-acre parcel, they're going to use a fraction of it, keep the remainder open, it's across from the Sanfordville School, it will provide moderate income senior housing and it will have little impact, certainly none on the school systems and pretty low amount of traffic. The process is if we are willing to accept the petition tonight and they have submitted it with the fee, we would then refer it to the Town Planning Board and they have 60 days to give us their professional opinion as to the benefit of bringing the zone down. That would then advise us on how we might rule to bring it down. We would then have a hearing to bring the zone down, once we do that it goes to the applicant to make a full application to the Planning Board for a full Planning Board review and environmental review. In the petition the applicant has provided an initial generic environmental impact statement to show if this were to move forward through the Planning Board what impact it might have on again, traffic, school etc. So, there is that analysis for the Planning Board to consider and then we would look forward to take their recommendation and they have 60 days to do it before we can act. We will refer to them and they have a Planning Board meeting next Wednesday, it will formally be given to them at that point and we will hopefully receive their opinions and then we can move forward. I think for us it's rather

exciting because it is the first time that this zone will be used in the town. It will help free up existing housing stock in our town which is at short supply to say the least and it will draw in some moderate-income housing for some of our seniors who would like to remain in town but maybe not in their own single-family home. I have met with the applicant and he has built many of these in New York State, so it's not that he's not familiar with it. He is also familiar with aesthetics of our community and what we would like to see in terms of architectural styles and he's very interested in doing just that. So, do I have the consent of the Board to accept the petition this evening?

Town Board - All reply yes.

Supervisor Sweeton - We will then refer it to the Planning Board. Thank you very much.

SUPERVISORS REPORT

- 1. We are in the middle of our Town Budget Process. We had a budget hearing the other day and we have a lot of work to do. We will schedule a hearing on a local law to exceed the tax cap. We hope that we do not exceed it, but if we do not pass the local law we would not be able to in the event that we can not get under the cap, which is 2% even though inflation is running anywhere between 4 and 6% and the increase in cost of state required healthcare and retirement are at a double digit number, but we still need to stay under the cap. We'll have to see where we go with this. Just so you know the preliminary budget is due on 11/1 and that is the budget that will go to the hearing. The hearing will be held in this room at 7:00 p.m. on November 9th and it needs to be adopted at our meeting on 11/16.
- 2. The Community Preservation Fund receipts for September were down a little bit. That's not surprising considering it's the month of September when school taxes are due, but it still came in at a hearty \$85,374.72 which brings the total to date since its inception in 2007 to \$16,471,599.05.
- 3. I will make note that on October 20th at 7:00 p.m. at Mountain Lake Park at the outdoor pavilion there's going to be a celebration of Hank Williams and it's a benefit to raise money for Spina Bifida Association. You can get tickets by going to hankwilliamscentennnial.eventbrite.com. Hank Williams I've learned suffered from Spina Bifida and unfortunately became an alcoholic because of it and died at a young age. This is a great benefit and Roam Food Truck will be there for food and adult beverages will be served. The evening is going to be headlined by our Marty Kupersmith. Marty Coopersmith is one of the original members of the Jay and the Americans, which is exciting. Marty is a great personality and it's going to be a great show and a great tribute to Hank Williams, so please come out and support that effort if you will and you will see the beautiful Mountain Lake Park. Hopefully it will be a crisp evening and not a cold evening.
