It is my understanding that new codes addressing amplified outdoor music, will allow the amplified music until 9PM? This is not acceptable at the sound decibels, currently being allowed. Are the codes going to allow wineries that currently respect the 5PM cut off to move their hours to 9PM?

I believe that the only "Farm Market" that plays music using extra loud speakers is Pennings Orchard. This is done every weekend, weather permitting. As I have expressed in the past Pennings Orchard, has no respect for their residential neighbors, their loud music can be heard through our closed windows, and air conditioning. This prevents resident neighbors from enjoying the outdoors, and environment. We are unable to entertain, garden, etc without loud music.

Does Farm Status equal concert venues every weekend?

The codes need to be worded to benefit not only the Farm Status, as this is just the beginning of many more venues now in the planning/development stage in Warwick Township. By doing the "right" and "fair" codes it will keep Warwick, from turning into a "anything" goes town. This also puts a burden on our police department and all public services.

The #1 money making product is alcohikm and not much good comes from promoting our community as having the most Farm Bars.

After 5PM all music should be moved indoors with the venues, doors, and windows closed. Before 5PM amplified music must be monitored.


Why are we accommodating a few businesses that are taking advantage of "Farm Status", expecially when they aren't acting farmlike?

Dear Members: I regret that I am unable to attend the public hearing on October 11 but respectfully submit the following comments for consideration.

In her letter to the editor of the Warwick Advertiser last week. Lori Scaffidi voiced serious and legitimate concerns about current and proposed regulations regarding the number of festivals and amount of amplified music/sound allowable at public events hosted by our local farms. I hope the Board will heed her concerns and place greater limitations on events that include amplified outdoor music which –over a period of hours–can disrupt the peace and quiet of families living in surrounding neighborhoods.

I too grew up on a working farm and feel blessed to beliving on agricultural land just outside the village. I have watched Warwick grow, many people moving here seeking refuge from the noise and hubbub of city life. Our farms too have grown, expanding their businesses to include markets offering grass fed beef, a bounty of fresh fruits and vegetables and featuring weekend activities, and educational programs, with fun for all ages. Complemented by a thriving downtown, Warwick has become a magnet for thousands of visitors from cities and towns across the tri-state area.

Growth does not HAVE to negatively impact the public good. But we all know that it can. And noise is huge! As you, the members of the Town Board consider your proposed regulations, I urge you to keep at the forefront of your thinking how far sound can travel!

How much is too much? Ask yourselves – would you want to hear nine or even six hours of amplified music continuously blasted within easy earshot of your home? On many of your weekends off? By all means welcome the people and the festivals but in the interest of the greater public good, and for peace in the Warwick Valley, please impose much-needed curbs on our exposure to outdoor noise. Thank you.

Dear Supervisor Sweeton:

I am unable to attend the public hearing on Proposed Local Law No. 9 of 2018 – A Local Law to Amend the Zoning Law. Since my home is situated close to a farm, a winery-apple orchard and the Warwick Technology Park, I will be affected by the proposed zoning changes.

My comments concern amendments to Article IV Section 164-46.J of the Zoning Law entitled "Special "Conditions" – "subsections (152) (d) and (e)." The amendments state "the use of amplified sound producing devices shall be prohibited except between the hours of 12:00 PM to 9:00 PM, and only unidirectional speakers shall be permitted for such sound producing devices..."

During the summer and fall, I can hear music from the winery on Four Corners on my property and sometimes inside my home on Kings Highway. While agri-tourism sites should be free to play amplified music, they should not infringe on someone else's freedom <u>not</u> to hear to the music.

Like agri-tourism sites, homeowners are also free to play music on their property and it should not be amplified to the extent that it can be heard inside a neighbor's house with all the windows closed. I respect their freedom to have "noise" and they should respect my freedom to have "quiet."

The amendments to the Zoning Law should include provisions on the decibel level allowed and the decibel level should vary depending the how close the agri-tourism site is to a residential property. A decibel level of 90 would be appropriate for a site that is surrounded by two miles of woods and fields on all sides. A decibel level of 60 would be appropriate for a site that is adjacent to residential properties. Sound at a loudness level of more than 100 decibels is harmful without ear protection – e.g. a leaf blower is about 110 dB. In all cases, the unidirectional speakers should not be pointed toward residential areas. The 60 dB limit and pointing speakers away from neighboring homes should apply to all residences and businesses in the Town of Warwick.

Thank you for your attention to my concerns.



How to Dispose of Latex Paint: Remove the lid, put the paint can in a safe place away from children and animals and let the paint dry out. If there is a large quantity of paint in the can, line a cardboard box with a black garbage bag, pour the paint in the garbage bag and add cheap, clay kitty litter until the paint is solid. Once dried, throw the solid paint in your household trash.

#### SMALL QUANTITY GENERATOR CERTIFICATION

I hereby certify that I am a generator of hazardous waste within the State of New York and that because of the small volume of hazardous waste generated and/or stored, I qualify for conditionally exempt small quantity generator status.

I understand that in order for conditionally exempt small quantity generator status, I must meet <u>all three</u> of the following conditions:


- 1. Generate less than 1 kg/month (2.2 pounds) of acute hazardous waste (as defined by 6 NYCRR Part 371), and never store more than this amount on site at any time; and
- 2. Generate less than 100 kg/month (220 pounds) of all other hazardous waste (as defined by 6 NYCRR Part 371), and never store more than 1000 kg/month on site at any time.
- 3. Transport a maximum of 220 lbs of hazardous waste at one time.

Only if I am a farmer, I realize that I may store up to 1000 kg. (2200 pounds) of non-acute hazardous waste pesticides on my farm without losing my conditionally exempt status, provided that these wastes are brought to a household hazardous waste collection program.

I further understand that if, in the future, I exceed the quantity limitations described above, I will become subject to additionally regulation as a hazardous waste generator and will no longer be eligible to participate in this type of collection program.

I certify that I have the authority to make these statements on behalf of my farm or business. Also, I, the undersigned, do hereby certify that the items brought for collection came from my farm or business located in Orange County.



#### Ordinance No. 2018-#13

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING CHAPTER XL- ENTITLED "ZONING REGULATIONS" OF THE REVISED GENERAL ORDINANCES OF THE BOROUGH OF RINGWOOD, COUNTY OF PASSAIC, STATE OF NEW JERSEY PROHIBITING MARIJUANA CULTIVATION, PRODUCTION, MANUFACTURE AND SALE

BE IT ORDAINED by the Municipal Council of the Borough of Ringwood , County of Passaic, State of New Jersey, as follows:

Section 1. That Section 40-4.4 "General Use Restriction" as set forth in Chapter XL – Entitled "Zoning Regulations" of the Revised General Ordinances of the Borough of Ringwood is amended to add the following provisions.

Marijuana cultivation facilities, marijuana production or manufacturing facilities, marijuana testing facilities and marijuana retail sales and stores are prohibited in all zone districts.

- Section 2. The Borough Clerk is directed to give notice at least ten (10) days prior to a hearing on the adoption of this Ordinance to the Passaic County Planning Board and to all other persons or entities entitled thereto pursuant to N.J.S.A. 40:55 D-15, including to the Clerk of adjoining municipalities.
- Section 3. After introduction, the Borough Clerk is hereby directed to submit a copy of the within Ordinance to the Ringwood Planning Board for its review in accordance with N.J.S.A. 40:55D-26 and N.J.S.A. 40:55D-64. If any section, paragraph, subsection, clause or provision of this Ordinance is adjudged invalid by a Court of competent jurisdiction, such adjudication shall apply only to the section, paragraph, subsection, clause or provision so adjudged and the remainder of the Ordinance shall be deemed valid and effective.
- Section 5. The remaining portion of Chapter XL, "Zoning Regulations" shall remain in full force and effect except as modified hereunder. All Ordinances or parts of Ordinances which are inconsistent with the provisions of this Ordinance are hereby repealed to extent to such inconsistency.

#### Ordinance No. 2018-#13

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING CHAPTER XL- ENTITLED "ZONING REGULATIONS" OF THE REVISED GENERAL ORDINANCES OF THE BOROUGH OF RINGWOOD, COUNTY OF PASSAIC, STATE OF NEW JERSEY PROHIBITING MARIJUANA CULTIVATION, PRODUCTION, MANUFACTURE AND SALE

Supervisor Sweeton and Members of the Town Board:

We are writing in reference to the *Town of Warwick Proposed Local Law No. 9 of 2018 A Local Law to Amend the Zoning Law.* 

We have lived in Warwick for 33 years. During that time, we have seen our Town and Village governments work intelligently and in a balanced manner. We always tell each other "We live in the best place!" and brag about our local governments to people who do not live here.

We appreciate the Town taking a closer look at the positive and negative aspects of agritourism. Unfortunately, the proposed law revisions fall very short of a balanced solution that would provide additional business options to our agriculture industry, while maintaining our Town's livability and quality of life.

To begin with, the use of amplification outdoors in the APO, in a manner consistent with the existing Town Code governing noise, is virtually impossible to regulate. Any amplified noise is going to carry. Any loud noise is going to carry (We can hear the Vernon High School Band 2 miles away!).

Additionally, the rules governing the number of allowable events, festivals, weddings, etc, combined with on-going noise between 12 and 9 pm, create the prospect of no peace and quiet for residents on weekends EVERY WEEKEND FROM THE BEGINNING OF MAY UNTIL THE MIDDLE OF OCTOBER.

We plan on retiring here and the prospect of noise filled weekends for the rest of our lives is painful.

We respectfully request that you spend more time evaluating and revising this law to meet the needs of the residents at large, not just to benefit a select few. We believe this is possible, and additional time spent on this would be time well spent. We also suggest that you convene a committee made up of residents and farmers that could come together and work with the Town on an equitable solution to a very complex problem.

We have confidence in you and know you can come up with the right solution that will keep Warwick "The Best Place" for us all.
