COUNCILMAN DE ANGELO REPORT

Their next fundraiser is the 3rd Annual "Fore the Animals" golf outing at Mansion Ridge Golf Course in Monroe hosted by the Foot Spa and Tea Bar of Warwick on May 7th. The outing includes 18 holes and they are in need of tee sponsors and prize contributors. Please contact Joann Daly at 986-7174 or Dan Thompson at 201-370-4005. They currently have available for adoption 15 dogs including a 1 year old Siberian Husky, 2 year old Anatolian Shepherd/Great Pyrenees, 4 year old Pomeranian, 1 year old Doberman mix and a 2 year old Mastiff mix plus other assorted mixes. There are 90 cats, 6 rabbits, 1 Guina Pig and 1 rooster. As usual they need Friskies Pate canned cat food, Friskies cat treats, Kong toys for large dogs, paper towels, heavy duty garbage bags and equine pine pellet bedding.

COUNCILMAN KOWAL REPORT

1. Last summer I was wondering the fish population in Wickham Lake. I know a lot of people they have had great fishing there. I know Mike has sent me a couple of old news stories about fishing contest that had included fish like walleye and back in the 1950's fish from Wickham Lake won the contest. At one time it was a very good habitat for that

species of fish, so it got me curious and I called up Wendy Rosenbach in Region 3 up in New Paltz and asked her if there was a reason why the fisheries department did not have Wickham Lake in rotation for stocking fish, she said yes because it was by the correctional facility for so many years and had no public access. I let her know that these things have changed so we talked about it for a while and she said the best thing to do is contact your state representatives and tell them you would like to have the DEC review the area and reassess it. I called up Senator Bonacic and Assemblyman Karl Brabenec and we received a letter from Senator Bonacic which I will read. "Thank you for your letter regarding Wickham Lake. Since receiving your inquiry, DEC Fisheries staff have visited the lake to assess public access. We were very pleased with the abundance and quality of access to the lake. In order for the DEC to stock fish here, we will need to conduct a boat electrofishing survey to assess the fish community. Our staff is planning to complete this in the spring. The results of this survey will be analyzed and a decision will be made if it is appropriate to stock walleye here. If the stocking of walleye is an appropriate management option, we will assign Wickham Lake a rank on the statewide list of waters waiting to be stocked with walleye. I will keep your office appraised of this process." That is all that we wanted was the experts to come and assess what needs we have for the lake and put us in the same cue as all of the other lakes have in the area. That's great news and I'm glad our State Representatives took the request seriously and the DEC responded pretty fast, I thought it would be a year or two by the time they came down and checked and we might have a report by this summer.

Supervisor Sweeton – Thanks for pursuing that and I know it will be a big hit for residents.

SECTION 1. PURPOSE:

To remove the ten-year limitation on the exemption provided for by Town of Warwick Local Law Number 1 of 2008 in relation to a real property tax exemption for Cold War Veterans authorized by Real Property Tax Law Section 458-b.

SECTION 2: EXEMPTION PERIOD:

As authorized by Chapter 290 of the Laws of 2017 of the State of New York, which amended Subparagraph (iii) of paragraph (c) of subdivision 2 of Section 458-b of the Real Property Tax Law, the exemption previously authorized by the Town Board under Local Law Number 1 of 2008 and Town Code Section 144, Article IV shall apply to qualifying owners of qualifying real property for as long as such person(s) remain qualifying owners, without regard to the previously existing ten-year limitation set forth in Real Property Tax Law Section 458-b.

SECTION 3: EFFECTIVE DATE:

This Local Law shall take effect in the manner provided in the New York State Municipal Home Rule Law and upon the completion of the requisite filings and procedures.
