The invitation is opened to all twolegged, four-legged, winged, scaled or gilled pets. All pets must be restrained or in carriers. The participants have been asked to bring one or more of the following items from their wish list. There will be a short service and each pet will receive a blessing. For more information please call 469-8605. The Warwick Valley Humane Society will be participating in the 2019 annual Applefest celebration. They will have a booth at South Street and the Railroad crossing. Their annual raffle drawing will be at 4:00 p.m. and winners not need to be present. They are having these events to try and raise money for a new shelter because they desperately need more room. Their wish list this month is bleach, paper towels, pate style cat/kitten food, heavy duty garbage bags, equine pine pellets, rabbit toys and food, spray bottles, KMR kitten milk replacer, non-automatic shut off heating pads and adopters. They want to thank the Town for the spay/neuter program, it's very successful.

- 2. There will be another Pumpkinfest in Pine Island on Monday, October 14th at the Pine Island Park from 11:00 a.m. until 3:00 p.m. I was asked by the chairman if we could have a few extra trashcans out there and paper products for the restrooms. A lot of people attend that event and last year there were over 500 kids plus adults there's over 1,000 people during the day, so that's a lot of taxes on the facility. We appreciate the job that DPW does to make sure everything is cleaned up and stays cleans.

SUPERVISORS REPORT

- 1. The State Controller's Office has a program they initiated a few years ago called Fiscal Stress Monitoring and it's designed to objectively identify issues with budget solvency and the ability to generate enough revenue to meet expenditures. They've been measuring this for every town, village city and county in New York State and they publish them once a year. They look at the financial condition as it relates to town, village, cities and counties, they look at yearend fund balances, deficits or surpluses, cash positions fixed costs and how you're managing your budget. Our number last year came at 18 and it's a scaled system, so 0-24 is you're ok there's no designation, from 25-44 you're susceptible to stress, from 45-64 says you're moderate stressed and 65-100 is significant stress. We have always had a no designation, but after the recession of 2008-09 and the slow recovery from that our numbers have generally been in the double-digit area and we worked really hard as a Board and employees and department heads to be as fiscally conservative as we possible could. I'm very pleased to tell the Board that our number for 2018 was 1.7 and it was one of the lowest in the County. I want to congratulate all of you and all of the employees and the department heads for continuing to make modest budget recommendations and for the Board helping me formulate a budget that is truly fiscally responsible and fair to our taxpayers. That score just came to us and I think in about 3 weeks they will be publishing the entire data base of New York. You go on line to the State Controllers Office and you can see the fiscal monitoring spreadsheets. You can actually download into excel and I want to congratulate everybody for that, good job.
- 2. Applefest is coming up on Sunday, October 6th and it will be as it usually is with 30-35,000 of our closest friends and it will be tough to get around. Our PD will be active and not only visibly active but active in ways you won't see to ensure that the festival area and the people attending are safe and knock on wood we will have another great day and a good festival. I know it presents a burden sometimes for residents, but all of our not-for-profits get a good significant amount of money for the year from that festival from out of town people. It's a good thing and we ask that you kind of grin and bear it.
- 3. I will be going on an Ag Business Tour tomorrow sponsored by Cornell Cooperative Extension and the Orange County Citizens Foundation. It is leaving from the Jolly Onion and visiting Westtown, Minisink farms the Minkus Farm and then to SS&O, and then back to the Jolly Onion and we are going to do a little presentation on the hemp project that we have going at the prison to the group. It's a way to get people familiar that may be not so familiar with agriculture and the kinds that we have in the County to understand that, so I'm looking forward to that.

- 4. The Receiver of Taxes wanted me to give a public service notice about School Tax Collection. Monday is the last day to pay it in person without penalty here. She wants everyone to know she knows it's a Jewish holiday but the tax office is open and if people can get it here, we will be here.
- 5. The Journal entries were made with the Comptroller this month and they were all in order, signed off on and approved.
- 6. Supervisors Corner is published each week in the Warwick Dispatch, with excerpts printed in the Warwick Advertiser.
